Five thousand dollars will be given by the Portland Commercial Club in prizes for the best newspaper and magazine articles on Portland, the state, or the Pacific Northwest. The offer holds good during the coming year and the one writing the best article will be rewarded with a check for \$1000. Second best will get \$500, and a gradually diminishing scale of prizes will reward 80 writers.

The contest is open to everyone. The conditions are that the articles must be printed in a newspaper of general circulation, printed anywhere outside of the states of Oregon and Washington. Marked copy of the publication must then be sent to the Portland Commercial Club, where it will be turned over to three judges named by the Governor of Oregon. The articles may be printed between the dates of November 1, 1909 and December 31, 1910.

Almost any phase of the Northwest may be used as subject matter of the articles. The length and treatment is optional with the writer. The plan of the Commercial Club is not to have the Northwest "boomed" in the common meaning of the term so much as it is to have the people of the country become more familiar with this portion of the United States and give expression to their views in such articles as will be acceptable to papers throughout the entire continent.

The decision of the judges will be absolutely impartial. There are prizes for 80 writers and the chances for winning are so many that entries in the contest should be large. That the publicity resulting from the prize offer will be wide and that much good will be realized for the whole Pacific Northwest is assured.

Oregon apple growers are assembling exhibits for the National Apple Show at Spokane November 15-20. The state will participate to a greater extent than ever before and some magnificent displays will be sent. Hood River, the Rogue River Valley and the Willamette Valley apple-growing districts will make strong bids for many of the prizes. Carload lots will be sent by some exhibitors and in all departments, Oregon's showing will be a strong one. Entries close November 13.

James J. Hill will not extend the Oregon Trunk beyond the Oregon line but will confine his operations in connection with that project to developing this state. Stories to the effect that the ultimate destination of the Oregon Trunk is San Francisco were denied by Mr. Hill this week, who said: "All the building the line will do will be done in Oregon. There is plenty of room for new feeders in the state and the mileage which we intend to add to our system will be confined to Oregon. We have no intention of entering California."

Great preparations are being made for the annual Hood River apple fair, Oct. 28, 29 and 30. The display of prize fruit will be bigger and better than ever and the attendance from outside points promises to be exceptionally large. Saturday, Oct. 30, will be Portland day. The Portland Commercial Club has been invited and citizens generally from this city will view the Hood River show in large numbers. Interest in the exhibit of fine apples at the fair is wide.

That the czar of Russia will have a royal orchard in Southern Oregon is the information given out by two nobles of his court, Anton Petroskovich and Peter Peteroff who have just completed an inspection of the Pacific Northwest to locate such an orchard. They decided to recommend the Rogue River Valley and are expected to close negotiations just made for a tract near Medford.

A Trip To Seattle

School Clerk Tells Of Interesting Things Seen In And Around Seattle

(Continued from last week)

I spent some little time at the Fair, and enjoyed it very much. The buildings appeared to be substantial and the grounds beautifully platted and well kept up. The electric display was intensely beautiful. All of the buildings I visited were most interesting in every respect. For me the Government exhibit was in the lead, and the foreign agricultural exhibits excelled in the Canadian building. This fair differed from no other fair, excepting that it was on a smaller scale than those of Chicago and St. Louis, and about the same as that held in Portland. By the way, I wish to mention, I spent some little time in the Government building, and one of the most attractive displays was that of the Postal Department. If anyone has anything to send to their friend or relative, and you wish it not to be seen by anyone else, don't send it through the Post Office. Anything from false teeth to preserved reptiles and dangerous weapons to love letters written on shingles and un-thinkable trinkets to a stuffed dog, can be found in the Dead-Letter exhibit. In the Fishery department, I can only express it as a maize of phenomena. I seen trout more beautiful than ever before came to my eyes, and one can see fish of every color of the rainbow and as many different ways of swimming. Some swimming up-side down, sideways, and while most of them swim as they should, I noticed some that didn't swim at all. I know of no better way to know of what the world is composed, than to visit a fair likened to that held in Seattle.

Upon leaving Seattle, my mind was indelibly impressed with the wonderful go-ahead spirit that is exhibited there. Large buildings are springing up everywhere, streets are being extensively improved, and it seems as though in many parts of the city the spirit of that populous is tearing down every other hill in sight. The expense of all these improvements is enormous, but to the glory of those people it is on. If anyone, perchance, should speak derogatory of anything in or about Seattle, it is certainly to be resented. It is a question with more conservative people from other sections, as to the endurance of so much activity, but one thing is certain, the people of Seattle have kept the music going for a number of years; and if they fail in the future, it is because they haven't the money to keep it up.

When I arrived in Portland, I felt relieved and contented with being home. In Estacada, I am tully consigned to happiness in this little village, but designed to spread a scale of unity and public spirit.
