### The United States Needs a National Charity Law.

By Dr. EMIL MUNSTERBERG, President of the Department of Public

S DIVERSE AS THE SOCIAL DIFFERENCES AND THE CLI-MATIC VARIATIONS OF NEW ENGLAND. THE SOUTH. THE PRAIRIES OF THE WEST AND THE MOUNTAIN DIS-TRICTS ARE THE ASPECTS OF PUBLIC AND PRIVATE CHARITY IN AMERICA. THERE IS INDISPUTABLE NEED UNIFORM LAW OF SETTLEMENT AND REMOVAL FOR THE WHOLE TERRITORY OF THE UNITED STATES.

Of course grave difficulties arise from the terms of agreement prevailing between the different states as to the responsibility for destitute members of various states. The only advisable principle in relief administration is TO GIVE EVERY ONE THE KIND OF HELP THAT HIS PARTICULAR CASE DEMANDS. Adhering to this principle involves the equipment of a great variety of institutions. To satisfy the growing demands of this description LARGE MEANS ARE REQUIRED, such as can be raised only by large and wealthy communities. In smaller communities the lack of means always goes hand in hand with DISTINCT AVERSION to such elaborate provision for the poor.

The poor are not beloved, and they are disposed of in the easiest | HIDES way. Very few states show any expenditure upon outdoor relief of he destitute.

OTHING could be more un-American than to be downcast over TEMPORARY discouragements or to despair of the republic because some of our people unhappily have lost their money ALMOST AS FAST AS THEY HAVE CHICAGO, ILL MADE IT.
