Do You Think It Will Rain?

Clackamas River Raises Higher Than Ever Recorded Here Before—Fear For Dam At Cazadero

The very wet weather that we have been having in Estacada during November has been the same all over the North West, with especially stormy weather at Astoria and along the Coast.

The continual rain culminated in an unusual down pour on Sunday night and by Monday noon the Clackamas had made a new high water mark, at least since government measurements have been taken in Estacada. Sixteen feet had been on record, but on Monday at 8 A. M. it registered sixteen and a half feet. By 2:00 P. M., at which time it commenced to fall, it had reached a stage of twenty-one and a half feet, a rise of five and one half feet in six hours.

Some concern was felt as to the wagon bridge at Cazadero, across the Clackamas, also large numbers of persons visited the dam at Cazadero where a beautiful sight was witnessed when the sixteen feet of water went over the dam, carrying on its surface high trees and drift wood of which large quantities floated down during the day. This being the highest recorded flood here it was but natural that most of our citizens were anxious to see its angry billows in their madness and picturesque beauty.

It was not hard to see that incalculable energy was running to waste. Mr. Sullivan, of the P. R. L. & P. Co., Geo. Cathart and others closely associated with the building of this dam were seen among the visitors anxious to learn what effect the big stage of water would have on it, but there it stood resisting and turning part of this power to where it could be sold as a merchantable commodity. Ten sections of the fish ladder leading into the flume was demolished and washed away. Road Arnel, supt. of the hatchery, was also busy taking care of the portions of interest to the hatchery.

Notice is hereby given that we, the undersigned tax payers representing ten per cent. of the tax payers in Road District No. 33, Clackamas County, Oregon, hereby give notice to the taxpayers of said Road District No. 33 that there will be a meeting of the tax payers of said District in Springwater school house, No. 24, at Springwater, on the fourth day of December, 1909, at 2 o'clock P.
