New Church To Be Dedicated Sunday

Nora Hale-Looney Memorial Church Building About Completed; Able Speakers To Be Present Next Sabbath For Dedication Exercises

The new church in the Garfield neighborhood, known as the Nora Hale-Looney Memorial church building, will be ready for dedication by next Sabbath. This is a splendid structure, centrally located in a rapidly growing community of enterprising people. All have shown hearty co-operation and the church stands now almost complete because "the people had a mind to work." The building contains three rooms, the main audience room, a double Sunday School room which can be thrown open, thus connecting with the main room, and the entrance room. The entrance is at one corner under a square tower which, instead of towering above the building, comes just to the top of the main roof where it is finished in battlement design. A large and beautiful gothic window 8 1/2 ft. by 12 ft. adorns the front in the center. Seating capacity is about 150, although 200 can be cared for.

The speakers for the Sabbath are from Salem and Portland and a rare treat is in store for us. Our District Superintendent, Rev. Moore, will preach in the morning. Dr. Rowland, well known here, has consented to come if possible. Every effort will also be made to secure the amiable Mr. McDaniel from Portland. After the morning service a light collation will be served from baskets brought for the occasion. Be sure to come, bringing your lunch. A genuine, royal good time is assured us in hearing the speakers meeting friends, and worshipping God. Plan to come and bring your friends. Let all come. This invitation is extended to all.

Services begin at eleven o'clock. Luncheon in the church at 12:30 and at 1:30 the dedicatory services begin, concluding about 3:00 P. M.
