Portland takes fourth place among cities of the United States in wheat exports for the 11 months of the current year ending with November. This is according to the report of the Secretary of the Treasury on breadstuffs exported from this country. Puget Sound comes next after Portland. New York is first, Philadelphia second and Duluth third. Last year Portland ranked second in the country in wheat shipments. The figures just compiled of wheat exports do not include large shipments of wheat from Portland to California. This tonnage is very heavy each year.

Residence Of E. E. Hannah Totally Destroyed By Fire

"Night Before Christmas" Fire Destroys Home, Clothing, Furniture, Toys, And Everything

On Friday evening last the home of E. E. Hannah, who lives in the Zolbrist Addition, caught fire and was totally destroyed. The building was a box style and was papered, which made it possible for the fire to spread rapidly. The family had just finished papering and getting it in nice shape for Christmas. The children's Christmas presents were stored in the house also. These, with everything else including all the clothing except that worn, was destroyed. It looked like a sad Christmas eve, to the little children who stood crying while their home burned.

Kind friends soon came to their rescue and a number of persons were busy in the crowd that gathered at the home while the building burned and before the fire was out a subscription of about one hundred dollars had been made. This has been added to until it will probably reach one hundred and fifty dollars. The children were specially remembered by the Sunday school children at their Christmas eve exercises, a collection was lifted to buy them presents.

These kindly tokens of sympathy were very much appreciated by Mr. and Mrs. Hannah and the children and helped them in a way to bear the loss they had met with. They will go to housekeeping in the Marchbank house on Broadway until they can arrange differently. The fire apparatus was taken up but by the time it arrived the building was doomed. They kept the flames from spreading to the stable.

Parker In Boise Penitentiary

Former Estacada Man Faces Long Prison Term For Forgery

Word has been received by Detectives Coleman and Snow from Warden Curtis, of the Oregon Penitentiary at Salem, that T. W. Parker, one of the most notorious professional forgers who ever operated upon the Pacific Coast and who has been badly wanted in this city for wholesale operations, had been located in the Penitentiary at Boise, Idaho, where he is serving an indeterminate sentence of from one to seven years for the same kind of crime under the name of John Davis.

The Hotel Portland, Meier & Frank Company, the O. W. P. Railroad and a number of other business concerns were victimized by Parker to the extent of \$50 each. It has been learned that Parker is also wanted for passing six checks in Salem and for passing five in Vancouver, Wash. The Washington authorities are also said to want Parker sent to prison for life on the charge of being an habitual criminal. Parker has served four terms in penitentiaries for forgery. One of these was spent in Salem and two in Walla Walla. He was arrested at one time and brought back to this city from the East by Detective Joe Day.—Morning Oregonian, Dec. 24th.

We feel sorry to learn all this, as Parker had been counted a good fellow around Estacada for more than a year, his father having bought a farm and placed him on it, and he seemed to be getting along nicely. Only a single individual knew of his previous prison record and as he seemed to be good, nothing was said of it. Even after it was known in local circles that he had done things lately in this vicinity that were not right, we overlooked it for the parents sake and thought it would not be long till he could be righted again. It seems, however, that he went from one degree to worse and if as alleged his wrong doing has gone to the extent reported, many year in the penitentiary confront him. It certainly pays to be good.

Who's To Blame For Incorrect Article

Facts Of Case Seem To Have Been Grossly Misunderstood By Telegram Reporter

Our attention has just been called to an article that appeared in the Telegram of Dec. 16th, relating to the accident on the Southern Pacific work at North Fork, in which one of the laborers was killed and one hurt. The article, from the standpoint of facts, shows the writer to either be a prevaricator or a much misinformed man. We are as close to this work as anyone can be and we did not see anything attempted to be concealed. In fact we know ourselves, that Mr. Blockley used every means to find out the relatives or friends of the dead Italian and instead of being buried quickly the corpse lay in the furniture store next door to our office from Thursday until Sunday, in an effort to find relatives, or how it was wished to dispose of the body. The accident was given as happening at Boring and the fault of a contractor. There is no contractor, the S. P. is doing the work themselves. We only mention this at this time to let those who may have seen the article know the truth. In our account of the accident given at the time, you will find the facts obtained from the most reliable source obtainable. If you really want to know what happens in our community look for it in the Progress.

Portland Railway To Build Power Plant

The Pacific Coast Engineering Company has been awarded the contract for putting in the foundation for a large power plant which will be erected on the river front at the foot of East Lincoln street by the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company. It will be necessary to drive about 4000 piling for this foundation and work will be under headway by January 1st. A large frame bulkhead will also be built to protect the piling and the whole area will be filled with sand and gravel and then covered with a thick layer of concrete. Work will be rushed as the company is desirous of beginning work on the construction of the power plant as soon as possible in order to have it completed next fall.—Portland Daily Abstract, Dec. 28th.
