## Estacada Fruit Growers Association Is Organized And Starts Out Under Favorable Conditions

An Enthusiastic Meeting At Its Organization in the I. O. O. F. Hall At Estacada On Monday

As previously announced in these columns, a meeting of the fruit growers of this district was held on Monday in the I. O. O. F. Hall and was well attended by the men who are taking an active part in the production of more and better fruit.

The committee appointed at a preliminary meeting some time ago, consisting of the following well known gentlemen: S. E. Wooster, P. F. Standish, W. P. Snuffin, Ed. Closser and A. D. Schmidt, reported to this meeting. A constitution and by-laws which were acted on, and after some minor changes were made, was adopted. The name of the association is The Estacada Fruit Growers' Association and its purpose is to interest and aid in producing better and more fruit.

Any resident or property owner interested in the growing of fruit in the district is eligible as a member. An admission fee of one dollar is charged and the dues were fixed at one dollar per year. The district comprises six townships, of which Estacada is about the center. The following localities are in the district: Dodge, Highland, Clarks, Elwood, Springwater, Viola, Redland, Logan, Eagle Creek, Dover, George, Bissel, Garfield and Estacada.

The officers are W. R. Stokes, president; S. N. Kilgore, vice president; A. L. Whitcomb, secretary; F. W. Bates, treasurer; E. L. Wonacott, Press Howell, E. W.

Botkin, Phil Standish and Walter Douglas, directors. At the meeting thirty five names were secured who paid their money and became members. It is the hope of the Association that they can secure the names of everyone in the district for members, as in a united effort much better and more intelligent work can be accomplished.

"In unity there is strength" is true in this fruit growing in many ways. As an illustration of this, Mr. Whitcomb, secretary-elect, had written to some of the big fruit handlers of Chicago, as well as to some of the railroads for rates and his deduction from the information received is that a dollar a bushel profit can be had on the ripe fruit, if handled properly.

This season dried prunes brought less than fifty cents a bushel. These figures, as received by Mr. Whitcomb, were based on an average of prices paid for a period of ten years in Chicago. The freight and refrigerator rates for such shipments have been secured and where a united effort is made and carload lots handled in quantity during the season, much better prices will be secured to the producers without any increase in rate to the consumers. More intelligent planting of trees can be secured as it will not be long until the growers will discover the advantage of producing the same kind of fruits in adjacent territory so that the same can be handled in quantity.
