Albert Kuchup, Henry Ineah-pamah and Ben Wilson have been selected for the mission and they will leave shortly. The Warm Springs contend that they have not been paid for land and fishing rights already taken from them and the commission is empowered to lay before the authorities the wrongs they have suffered in the past and demand that the land and fishing rights be given back to them or they be paid the money value of the same before the white men and railroads come in and take any more of their land and timber.
