OREGON CONSERVATION COMMISSION

We are just in receipt of a copy of the first report of the Oregon Conservation Commission. As conservation of our natural resources is one of the important public questions of today we desire, as space permits, from time to time to call the public attention to certain phases of this question.

It should be stated this commission was created by the last legislature, that of 1909, and is composed of seven members, appointed by the governor who serve without compensation. The work of the Commission is "to ascertain and make known the natural resources of the state of Oregon and to cooperate with the National Conservation Commission to the end that the natural resources of the state may be conserved and put to the highest use."

It should be an inherited ambition of every man and woman to be familiar with the important public questions that concern us, especially those of our own state. In Oregon only a small part of our natural resources have been developed and as the great, undeveloped values of our arid lands those suitable for irrigation, or the dry farming methods to be applied where irrigation is impossible; the utilization of our vast timber forest where stands one-sixth of the timber of the United States and the fabulous stumps of electric horsepower of our streams, and remember they are ours - ours to use and protect.

In order that we may use them and protect them we must be familiar with them and what they are. How many of our citizens even are familiar with any of these natural resources? Many of our old residents have never seen but a few miles of our beautiful Clackamas with its wealth of power sites just being developed. To know your own state or community is a very wise plan.

One thing the commission has adopted we desire at this time to speak about. It is the offering of prizes to students in our schools and colleges for the best papers on conservation topics as applied to Oregon. Prizes aggregating \$1,350 have been offered by this commission to the students of our universities, colleges and high schools for the best papers on these very topics that we should be interested in. The money for these prizes has been contributed by voluntary contributions from the people. The conditions and the topics to write from we will be glad to furnish to any pupil desiring this information as we do not have space sufficient to publish all the topics and conditions. The Progress will furnish them to you for the asking. The time limit when they must be in for this year is June 15, 1910 and the sums paid for a single paper is sufficient, we believe, to interest some of our pupils here in Estacada. Don't think these are prizes to be drawn by others. Why not have contributions on these subjects from here?

Forest Supervisors of Oregon, Washington and Alaska will meet in Portland March 21-26. The program includes many subjects of great importance in the administration of forest affairs and the gathering will have much to do in shaping policies to be followed in future. L. P. Kneipp, Assistant Forester, will attend the conference as the representatives of the Washington office, it being impossible for Forester H. S. Graves, who succeeded Gifford Pinchot as the head of the bureau, to come. The supervisors will discuss methods to be followed in meeting common problems and successful experi-

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ments in meeting difficulties will be told for the benefit of all. In the interchange of experience and new ideas the supervisors hope to profit largely at the coming session.

Hogs broke all former records in the Portland market late last week, when the remarkable price of \$11 a hundred pounds, live weight was paid by local packers for the best Eastern Oregon porkers. This price was not only the highest ever paid here in the memory of packers but leads the whole United States for the last half century at least. For about one week Portland has had the distinction of leading the whole United States in being the highest priced hog market. When hogs went to \$10.10 and \$10.25 last week, it was thought the limit had been reached but the jump to \$11 shows the scant supply of high class porkers in this market and the strong demand.

Traffic arrangements are being completed between the Hill roads, The Great Northern, Northern Pacific and Spokane, Portland & Seattle, and the Oregon Electric Railway whereby a traffic interchange will be established that will give the Willamette Valley a competing line with the Southern Pacific on transcontinental freight.

This arrangement is bound to prove an advantage to the people of the whole valley for competition in transportation, as in everything else, is helpful.
