The new concrete transformer built by the P. R. L. & P. Co. has been completed and is now ready for adding the machinery. The building is solid concrete 14x18 and the direct 30,000 volt current from the Cazadero power plant will be tapped in and reduced to 2300 volts and then sent into the converter that has been in use here from where it will be sent out on the electric lighting system at 110. It is expected that this service will greatly increase the efficiency of our city lights.
