Portland's big new packing plant just completed by the Swift interests, began killing livestock Monday. From now on, it will enlarge its operations until all the departments and allied industries are under way. It is expected to be two or three months before the big \$2,000,000 plant is in full operation The completion of this great packing house is a big boost for the producers of livestock not only in this state but throughout the Northwest. The killing department is prepared to handle about 500 cattle a day as a starter and has a capacity of 1000 hogs and sheep. The interest shown in livestock production throughout the big territory tributary to this market will largely determine the magnitude of operations by the VEAL new plant. Hogs reached \$11.10 HOGS during the past week.

Century Ago First Settlement Started

Oregonian Editorial Calls Attention To The Fact That Century Has Passed Since First Settlement Here

Just 100 years ago this Spring. the Oregon country felt the tread of the first Americans bent on occupation and settlement. Numerous American for traders had touched the shores of the present-day Oregon and Washington in the twenty years preceding. Lewis and Clark five years before, had spent the Winter at Clatsop, as explorers. In 1792. Captain Gray, a Boston pavigator, had discovered and entered the Columbia River. Now came Captain Nathan Winship in 1810 in the "Albatross" to foung a settlement and trade with the Indians But flood of the Columbia River swept over the settlement at Oak Point, Indians were hostile and competition of John Jacob Astor's fur enterprise was approaching, so that Captain Winship in a few weeks abandoned the effort. Early next year the Astor sea party arrived in the ship Tonquin and founded Astoria. After them came other Americans and the opening of the Oregon trail.

Examination For Adulterants or Doddo

"This examination requires but little time and will be given pre- OREGON CITY, - - - OREGON cedence over all other work. All samples sent for this purpose will be examined at once and report sent by mail, or on request, by telegraph, at the expense of the receiver."

Test For Purity

"This requires the separation of the sample into three parts: (1) Pure seed; (2) Foreign seed; (3) Dirt and-chaff; and the determination of the percentage by weight of each of these three parts and identification of the weed seed pres-

This test requires considerable time and can be made only by ex perts. The facilities of the laboratory will permit not more than five such tests to be made for any one firm or individual in any on calendar month. Purity tests will be made and reports sent as promptly as possible and in the order in which the samples were received

Test For Germination

"This test is made to determine the percentage of seed which will germinate under favorable conditions. The seed of cereals, clovers and many vegetables can be easily tested without the use of special apparatus. Some seeds, however, including a number of the grasses are more difficult to test requiring exact conditions of temperature and moisture, and considerable time.

Samples will be tested for germination in the order in which they are received, and not more than ten tests for germination will be made for any one firm or individual in any one calendar month."

Directions For Sending

1. All samples should be drawn so as to represent accurately the dition of the mucous lining of the Ru- bulk seed from which they are

2. The size of sample should b a tablespoonful for small seeds, such as clovers and grasses, and five tablespoonfuls of the larger

3. All samples should be marked hand. with the name and address of send
