No Reason For Pessimism Here

Albany Citizen Clearly Shows Oregon Has No Broken-Hearted People, And Markets Are Unlimited

General Manager Struble, of the Albany Commercial Club, recently received a letter from a friend, whose observations of the West, judging from the tenor of his epistle, would lead one to believe he had made the trip in a balloon. The letter referred to and Mr. Struble's reply are herewith appended:

What the friend wrote: "I know you have a wonderful country there in many respects, but at the same time I find upon investigation that there are more insane asylums, more disappointed, broken-hearted people on that Western slope than any other part of the United States. Your markets are limited to the coast there on the rim of the western continent, cut off from all the populous and greedy East by the cost of transportation."

What Mr. Struble wrote in reply: "Your statistics about insane asylums, disappointed folks and broken hearts on the Pacific Coast surprised me, and I will have to confess I am 'from Missouri' on that point—at least so far as good old Oregon is concerned. I can see where there might be many broken hearts, lunatics, etc., in Alaska, for instance, and in some sections of some of our neighboring states, but I doubt the percentage in Oregon. Again I fear your conclusions are wrong as to the limitation of our markets to the consumption of this coast. Portland is the greatest lumber port of the world, and the products of its mills go to markets east, west and oriental. It is the second greatest wheat shipping port in the world, standing next to New York, and its grain and flour go to every part of the world. The value of the standing timber of Oregon is estimated at over \$3,500,000,000, or
