Census Enumerators Begin April 15th

Gigantic Task To Be Completed In One Month; Be Considerate Of The Enumerator

Out of fourteen applicants for census enumerators in this portion of the county only three passed a sufficient per cent to pass the examination; these were Rev. Kuhlman, D. F. Warner and Robt. Duncan.

D. F. Warner has received his appointment and will take the census of Estacada and a portion of the country district East.

The census is taken every ten years and each census has found the government desirous of securing more data and in consequence of this it is necessary for the enumerators in the discharge of their sworn duty to ask more questions. This is not simply to be inquisitive but that this compiled data secured by the government at a great cost may be put in useful form for the information as well as the profit of all the people.

These enumerators should receive courteous treatment from the people, for it is their business to secure the information desired and they are sworn to secrecy. Each of us may be anxious before the next ten years rolls by to consult these compiled figures for the information we desire. We might withhold and refuse to give the information and be generally disagreeable ourselves toward the enumerator but they will secure the information just the same and think less of you for being a "crank."

As the time to begin taking the census is April 15 and must be completed in four weeks from that date, you will save yourself and the enumerator time by commencing now and setting down on paper in some convenient place some of these questions, how old you are, how much grain, vegetables, etc. you raise, how many eggs your hens produce, and keep going over
