John Bates started on Monday to clear the ground preparatory to building on his lots on Broadway.

On Friday "Johnny" Jones was setting them up to the boys all because a baby girl had come to their home.

Only four votes were recorded against the proposed \$40,000 bond issue to erect a high school at Lakeview.

A canal will be begun soon to drain and reclaim 19,000 acres in the Wood River Valley, Klamath County.

The P. R. L. & P. Co. have changed their plan to build the rail road to the upper power site at once. It will be built later, probably next year.

E. A. Miller, of Portland, formerly of Estacada, has gone back East to make a visit with his friends of boyhood days and relatives. His destination being Burr Oak, Mich.

"Bill" Jones and "Zeb" Martin were two enthusiastic disciples of Isaac Walton that took a "hike" for the head waters of Clear Creek the first day of the season and returned with plenty of theory but few trout.

Mr. and Mrs. Cowan, of Eugene, are at present visiting Mrs. Cowan's mother Mrs. Johnson and her brother I. N. Johnson, who have bought and are improving some acreage owned by them near the old mill site of E. M. Miller. The Cowan's may become permanent residents of this section.

O. B. Coldwell of Portland and M. T. Hopkins and L. R. Lee of Columbus, Ohio, came out in the company's private car last week and had luncheon at the Estacada after which the party made an inspection of the drill work at the River Mill Co. site for the power plant and then went to inspect the work at the Cazadero power plant.

The Multnomah-Clackamas Annexation Club, of which B. Lee Paget is president, has arranged a meeting at Sandy, Eagle Creek, Boring and Estacada. The meeting at Boring has been held. Mr. Paget has been addressing the meeting generally and gives his reasons why we ought to be a part of Multnomah.

One of the big wheat farms of the state was sold the past week when the lands of the J. A. Woolery estate, in Morrow County, passed to a syndicate of North Dakota bankers. The sale included 19,000 acres and the price paid was \$150,000. It will be cut up into small farms.

The purchase of a big tract of timber land on the Siuslaw River during the past week by Porter Bros., believed to represent J. J. Hill, strengthens the belief that the east and west line across Oregon will be built.

April 1st, "All fools day" as well as the one anxiously looked forward to by the angler for the wary trout, was ushered in at Estacada this year in an unusually quiet way. Not many fishermen were seen on the streams here, and those who did go were not very successful. The weather was fairly good from a fisherman's point of view, but the catch was small and of small size.

R. C. Herring, who was for many years a Garfield rancher but who had sold out his ranch intending to return to New York state, has again invested in property here. He closed a deal with B. R. Grub last week whereby he becomes the owner of the new house recently erected in the Zobrist Addition. It is Mr. Herring's intention however, in a few days to start back East to make a visit with old friends in his

native state. He has leased the property purchased to Bonney, the photographer.

### Noted Oregon Man Found Dead

Judge Williams, Of Portland, After A Long And Honored Career Answers The Last Call.

George H. Williams, who has won the distinction of being "Oregon's Grand Old man" by his long and useful service to the state as well as to the nation, was found dead in bed on Monday morning when his daughter called at his room about 7:30.

Judge Williams had only ten days ago celebrated his eighty-seventh birthday at a public banquet held in his honor, at which a great many of the noted men of Oregon were present to do honor to one who had spent most of his life as a public servant.

The republicans of Oregon elected Judge Williams to the United States Senate in 1864 and from that time he was honored with the care and reconstruction of measures for the reconciliation of the North and the South as his great ability was soon discovered by President Grant who later made him Attorney General, he being the only Oregonian who has served in the cabinet. Judge Williams has had not only the respect of the republicans through his long and varied career as jurist, lawyer, wise counsellor, orator, statesman and citizen, but of all. Governor Benson, as soon as he was informed of the death, ordered the flag on the capitol at half mast. Also in Portland and elsewhere throughout the state evidence of mourning for the deceased was observed.

A great and useful life has been finished. His end came as he had often expressed a desire it should: quickly and without trouble to others. He retired in his usual good health the evening before and as he lay peacefully and quietly at rest in the morning it required the family doctor, who had been called to make the usual death test before pronouncing that the sleep was the one long sleep of death.

### Will Build New Trail In Mountains

H. Mendenhall, forest ranger in the Cascade Forest Reserve, is now engaged in organizing a force of about ten men to begin at once the construction of a trail from the old hatchery on the Clackamas up the Collewash and on through to intersect with the trail leading to Detroit. The distance is about 35 miles and is through a very rough country. It will lead through the hot springs on the east branch of the Collewash and then continue south. This trail, with the construction of one in contemplation from Cold Spring cabin to the Hot Springs on the Collewash, will make a net work of trails that will cover the reserve.
