The extraordinary importance of the modern Young Men's Christian Association in the twentieth century city is emphasized by statistics obtainable at the Portland institution.

The great 8-story building at Sixth and Taylor Streets was opened six months ago and considered ample for twenty years. Within 60 days from the opening every available inch of room was being utilized.

Today it is the permanent residence of 267 men, and 700 take their meals there daily. An average of 75 different classes, meetings and gatherings are held in the building every night, Sunday excepted. Three physical directors are regularly employed and more than 1500 men and boys take part in physical work. There are 2883 members on the rolls, and in excess of 3,000 men visit the building daily.

Officials of the Portland Rose Festival have been advised that the moving picture trust will send ten operators, with five moving picture cameras, from the headquarters of the picture trust in Europe to Portland to take complete pictures of the coming Festival parades and exercises. These films, when manufactured, will be distributed very widely and shown all over the world. It is estimated by Festival officials that no less than 100,000, 000 people will see the attractions of Oregon roses in this way.

Meeting To Be Called For Street Work

The mayor and city council contemplate the calling of a public meeting for the purpose of considering the advisability of improving the streets and issuing bonds for its payment. The particular work contemplated is the grading down of Main St. hill to a better grade and extending the improvement out on Main St. to the county road running to Currinsville.

Sewers also should be constructed and other improvements made on the streets. Census Army Waits Coming Of Friday

With the break of day Friday, a host of 70,000 interrogators, men and women, white, black, yellow and brown, will be turned loose in pursuit of the people of the United States.

On that day Uncle Sam will begin the numbering of his children in preparation for the 13th census. He estimates that he has a family of about 90,000,000 men, women and children and he already has employed and will then put to work a body of enumerators considerably greater than the standing army.

The enumeration will cover all of the 45 states and two territories of the Union proper, and also Hawaii, Porto Rico and Alaska. The Philippine Islands and Guam will not be included, as special arrangements are made for numbering the people of those dependencies.

The mere getting of the information will cost the Government \$5,500,000. Of this amount, \$4,500,000 will be paid to enumerators and the remaining \$1,000,000 to supervisors. With a few exceptions the enumerators will be paid on the basis of the work done. In the country the remuneration will be from 20 to 30 cents for each farm reported, while the pay for names will range from 2 to 4 cents. The districts will average 1300 names, 1000 in the country and 1600 in the city.

Supervisor Beach held a meeting of instruction for enumerators at Astoria Sunday afternoon, returning to Portland in the evening. Similar meetings were also held at Pendleton, La Grande and The Dalles in the last few days.
