## Strawberry Festival

Estacada Commercial Club To Advertise Estacada And Vicinity By Strawberries

At a meeting of the Commercial Club on Monday evening a very full attendance showed the interest being taken in our strawberry exhibit and festival. It was decided to hold it on Saturday June 4th all day and evening. It was thought by some to be too early for the best berries, but the general opinion prevailed that it being the only convenient date to be secured, with favorable weather conditions plenty of home grown berries could be secured. The week following is the Rose Show at Portland and the Saturday of the following week the pavilion and park could not be secured as others already had them rented.

A splendid day for Estacada and all berry raisers is anticipated. The intention of the festival is for the purpose of advertising our berry opportunities and fruit lands and while the berries will be served and a charge made for them, that the festival is gotten up to make money from is not the intention. It is hoped however that money enough can be secured by this means to meet the expense of the day. A good band is to be secured and this is always expensive costing probably \$150 for the day and evening. A dance and ball games will be the only forms of amusement. It is expected to have booths and tables attractively arranged in the park where strawberries, strawberries and cream, strawberries and sugar, strawberries and ice cream, strawberries and cake, in fact strawberries to please the connoisseur or anyone else any way you want them, for it is to be Strawberry Festival Day for Estacada.

Sparks offers a special prize of \$1.00 for the best box of largest sized berries. Those who wish to compete for prizes can bring the berries to the Commercial Club room where the committee on exhibits will arrange for their display and it will be left to them to appoint a judge of exhibits.

## Why Not Ship Green Prunes East?

Estacada Fruit Grower's Association Gathers Statistics Regarding Fruit Acreage And Yield

A committee from the Estacada Fruit Grower's Association has been gathering statistics regarding the acreage and yield of fruit throughout the country surrounding Estacada, in order that the directors of the association might know how much fruit will be raised

this year. In getting this data it was deemed advisable to ascertain the acreage and variety of young trees being set out, in order that prospective planters might be guided in their choice of varieties.

In view of the recent storms having killed the entire fruit crops in some of the best orchard countries of the East, and caused a partial failure over the greater part of the Eastern Fruit Belt, it seems that the Association would be able to obtain a very good price for prunes shipped green to Eastern ports. We are raising a sufficient supply of prunes to enable us to ship in carload lots, providing that the growers in the community will stand together. After the low prices dried prunes have brought for the last two years, all the farmers should seize this opportunity of getting the marketing of the prune crop on a paying basis, by joining the Association and shipping their fruit through it.
