## East And West Line Across Oregon

That the Hill lines will eventually run east and west through the central part of Oregon has been given out, also as a result of this railroad building a deal has been consummated whereby a transfer of realty has occurred that, for extent, is the largest that has occurred in the history of the United States. The Willamette Valley & Cascade Mountain Wagon Road Company have transferred all their holdings to the Oregon & Western Colonization Co. The lands which are now to be opened up by this company, extend from about twelve miles from Albany to Ontario and was a grant made by the government for the construction of a wagon road through the state and was made about fifty years ago. The owners of it were French capitalists and while many overtures have been made to them for its purchase they have held the grant practically in tact, refusing to sell it in tracts. It is the intention of the new owners to sell these lands to actual settlers and for this purpose offices will be established over the United States and Canada, where purchasers may apply for the lands and will be accommodated in their purchase by terms to suit all.

The corporation is composed of St. Paul capital and men. W. P. Davidson is president, John E. Burchard vice-president, O. A. Robertson treasurer, Jos. C. Wood secretary. A number of automobiles have been sent to Ontario for use in taking prospective purchasers over the lands, which will be sold at from \$15 to \$200 per acre. Officers of the company have just commenced to go over and appraise the lands and it is expected in thirty days that swarms of new homeseekers will be on the ground.

Prineville, Burns, Vale and Ontario are cities of from 2,000 to 6,000 population in the district and there are numerous other smaller towns. Agricultural, fruit, timber and mineral lands are to be found here. Oil and gas also exist and are just being developed. The possibilities of this country with a railroad cannot be computed, and by the way this road is heading straight for Estacada and while it has never been mentioned those who are looking ten years in the future see visions of a through line passing our very doors.

### Estacada Defeats Brooklyn

The game Sunday between Estacada White Socks and Brooklyn was one of the best games of the season, and the fans say it was the best they ever saw in Estacada. ### P. R. L. & P. Lets Contract For Dam

The P. R. L. & P. Co. on Wednesday let a contract for the construction of the dam at the River Mill site to the Puget Sound Bridge & Dredge Co., the contract price being \$325,000. The dam will be concrete and of the Amburns patented hollow dam type. It will be 700 feet long and the water will have a head of 135 feet. It is said that construction work will begin at once and will be pushed to completion. It is hoped to finish the plant this year but this will depend entirely upon the stage of the water and other conditions.
