Henry Cromer started on Tuesday to crush rock with the new steel crusher which the county has just purchased to replace one that has been in use here for some time. We understand it is to be used by the Springwater and Garfield road districts.

Mark Jones Accidentally Shoots Himself

Mark Jones son of Len Jones of Clackamas Station, who about ten days ago joined Forest Ranger Mendenhall's crew of trail builders, while cleaning a revolver on last Thursday evening accidentally shot himself in the groin with a thirty-eight, double action, Smith & Wesson.

The accident happened at the camp located about six miles from the old fish hatchery on the Clackamas. The crew is engaged in building a new trail up the Collawash to intersect a trail running to Detroit, Ore. Mendenhall was out about ten days ago hiring additional men and with others Mark Jones went in with him. On Thursday evening while sitting alone in front of his tent cleaning the revolver which he supposed was empty the gun was discharged, the ball striking him about two inches above the naval and a little to the left side.

Other companions who were in their tents came out to see what he had shot at and he informed them he had accidentally shot himself. Mendenhall being down at the hatchery two of the men started at once to inform him of the accident and covered the distance of six miles over a rough trail in one hour and ten minutes a-foot. Here they found Ranger's Mendenhall and Gribble, the latter being sent out to Estacada for a doctor and Mendenhall going on in to camp. Mr. Gribble reached the settlement about 8 A. M. and phoned for Dr. Adix who started at once for the scene of the accident. At Roaring River he was met by a party a-foot who had left the camp at daylight to inform him that Jones was dead.

The bringing of the body out from the camp over a rough mountain trail, a distance of forty miles, was a very tedious and trying task, as the body was carried by hand on a stretcher for about twenty miles and then packed on a horse the balance of the distance. As Leck Irvin, a packer from Garfield, went in as far as Roaring River and met them. The body was brought to the Estacada Furniture Co's. undertaking room about 8 P. M. Saturday where it was prepared for burial and driven to Clackamas Station leaving Estacada about 10 P. M.

The deceased leaves a father, mother and several brothers and sisters to mourn his untimely death.
