Washington D. C. May 25—We are sitting at our room window looking out over this great city, of which we feel justly proud after our six strenuous days of sight-seeing and duties as delegates to this great Sunday School convention of the world. Twenty-four different countries have delegates here of able men and women. Such a convention as this has never been held anywhere. The U. S. Congress passed a resolution to adjourn and presented it to this convention to review in line the delegates assembled. There were 10,000 men in line carrying the banners of the different countries and states, they passed in front of the capitol building and were reviewed by the House of Representatives and 100,000 people, also President Taft made the speech of welcome, welcoming the nations of the world to our capital city, stating the great importance of our meeting and its effects upon our people and of the binding closer the nations of the world. He also advised more interest from the business world and people at large, especially of our own country, their duties as parents teachers and leaders in this great Sunday School convention.
