Straw Vote On Liquor Question To Be Taken

At a meeting of the City Council on Tuesday evening it was decided by a unanimous opinion to request the voters of Estacada to take a straw vote Monday evening June 27th from 7 to 9 P. M. in favor of or against the granting of license to sell liquor in the city. The purpose is to ascertain the opinion of the majority and is not to be construed as an official or legal election. The Council believes they now have the full right to either grant or refuse to license and so far as their legal right is concerned this election would not alter that opinion; however a majority opinion expressed in the straw vote will be respected by the Council and their future acts will be consistent with the majority as expressed in this straw vote. Complaint and fault is found with conditions existing now. It is believed that we do not have the benefits of a no-license town because the influence is the same as if a licensed saloon existed and the city receives no benefit financially. To license soft drink or near beer places is certainly not any improvement of the morals from granting a regular license. The city is in great need of this revenue to carry on needed improvements. If the people of Estacada do not want any licenses granted it is evident they do not want near beer places, so if a no-license policy is voted the council will at once take steps to close these places and they will then expect the people to then sustain a tax policy. If the people desire a license, conditions will be required of those applying so that order and decency and the protection of the public will be guaranteed by a heavy bond.

To License Saloons Under \$5,000 Bond

1st. What would you do if you were on the city council? The streets of the city will be in an impossible condition this Winter unless the money is raised in some way to fix them and as the bonds have been advertised twice and there are no bidders it is getting to be a serious question.

2nd. Is prohibition a failure at present? The council is being censured for allowing the near beer places to run, as it is claimed they are worse than saloons on account of minors being allowed in them and they would not be allowed in saloons. It is also claimed that at present that liquor stronger than near beer is being sold to minors or anyone, although Mayor Reed has a standing order of \$25 to anyone who will furnish evidence to convict anyone of violating the law.

3rd. Would it not be better under the circumstances to grant one or two licenses, say at \$1,000 each and make them furnish a bond of \$5,000 with the provision in the ordinance that at any time that they were found violating the ordinance that their license would be revoked and make the ordinance to include the following provisions: that the room contain no chairs, card, billiard or pool tables; that there be no blinds, screens or anything to obstruct the view from the outside to any part of the room; that they shall close at 9 o'clock P. M. until 6:30 A. M. and not open on Sunday?

Baseball Games

Sunday on the Estacada grounds Estacada and the Fultons, of Portland, played a seven inning game, commencing at 1:30, that was quite interesting for the "fans." Good ball was played by both teams. It had been agreed that only seven innings should be played, as two games were scheduled for the afternoon. We think it a mistake to try to have more than one game a day especially on Sundays. This created some trouble in Sunday's game and the second game brought in very little money. It was the Portland Maroons vs Estacada, the score being 8 to 4 in favor of the Maroons. The game between the Fultons and the home team was a tie, neither team making a score.

In the game between Eagle Creek and the Portland Giants, a colored team from Portland, Eagle Creek was defeated. Score 7 to 4. It was a good game and the gate receipts satisfactory.

Saturday afternoon Estacada's 2nd nine crossed bats with the Garfield team. It being the second game between these rival teams much interest was manifested, especially between the players. For the home team Gartner started in to pitch but in three innings Garfield scored so heavily against them that it was decided to turn him out in the field. John Osborn finished the game in the box and so well did he do that Garfield only scored three runs in seven innings. Fleming was behind the bat and kept the ball from tearing holes through the wire backstop. Lee Bronson pitched for Garfield and Bokke did the catching. They proved to be too strong for the home team and when the score was added up it was found to be 15 to 12 in favor of Garfield. "Tim" Reagan and "Jack" Cassidy did the umpiring.

Annual School Meeting

On Monday evening the Estacada school district held its annual meeting in the school building. The work of the year was reported, which showed a good healthy growth. Two additional teachers had been employed, making six in all. The district has established a policy of rewarding good work of the teachers by increasing their salaries two and a half dollars per month. This method offers an additional incentive to do good work as well as to remain with the district. T. J. Reagan, the retiring director was requested by a number of persons to become a candidate for re-election but positively refused to allow his name to be used. J. P. Woodell was elected director and L. E. Belfils re-elected clerk. It was decided to call a special election at a later date when the assessment roll had been completed and the valuation of the district established.

Says We Have Beautiful Scenery

The Selig Polyscope Co., of Chicago, who have been taking pictures of Estacada scenery for the moving picture business, have been much pleased with the scenery but owing to the cloudy weather they do not think they secured very good photos. First Strawberries In Southern Garfield

Says First Berries Planted Long Time Ago—Estacada-Garfield Berries A First-class Article Now

As so much is being said about strawberries in this vicinity I believe it proper to give a true account of the strawberry's introduction into this part of Oregon.

The first tame plants set out near Estacada in South Garfield were set out by Mrs. Edna Davis, mother of Wm. and J. J. Davis, on the spot now occupied by Wm. Davis' residence. They were procured down in Damascus from Deardorfs; not understanding the nature of the berries they were set too thick and too much fertilizer was used, so there were only blooms and vines

and no berries. That was about the year 1873.

The next was bought and brought in by Mr. Dock Palmateer in 1882. They were of the sharpless variety he gave five dollars for 50 plants and his wife sold the berries off those vines to Mrs. Dave Caulfield, who lived where Ed. Wonacott now lives.

That was the beginning of the strawberry culture out here. Then Mr. W. P. Snuffin saw what berries would do on our perfect soil and bought a home in Garfield and set out the first commercial strawberry field in this part of Clackamas County. Mr. Wm. Holder, knowing Snuffin to be a thorough berry man, followed suit. Others seeing their success have gone into the berry business until it is no more an experiment, as our Estacada-Garfield berries of all kinds are second to none. There need be no fear to invest in a piece of land out here and go into the fruit and berry business for sure success is theirs.
