### Close Vote On License Question

Difference Of One Vote Decides Election—Much Interest Manifested—75 Votes Cast

The licensing of saloons in the city of Estacada has long been an annoying problem to the Council, who at all times since their election have been willing to sacrifice their personal opinion in the matter and serve the majority, if that could be ascertained. It must be remembered that the electors who put the present councilmen in to serve them were made up from those who entertained antagonistic views on this question. The Council had hoped that the people in their own manner would show which had the majority opinion. Up to the present time no such means had been taken as it had become very unpleasant to be trying the best they knew how to serve the people and in doing this they were constantly annoyed by the criticisms of the one or the other sides to the controversy.

At a council meeting held Tuesday the 21st this was thoroughly gone over and it was the unanimous opinion of the Council to ask the citizens to meet on Monday evening and take a straw vote on the licensing of saloons, as it was believed this was the only correct way to know what the popular opinion was and it was decided that a majority opinion expressed in that manner should be respected. The straw vote was accordingly taken on Monday evening, which resulted in 38 votes being cast in favor of granting a license and 37 against it.

### Public Meeting Protests Licensing Of Saloons

Quite A Number Of People In Attendance At Meeting To Discuss Saloon Question

A public meeting was held at the Commercial Club rooms on Sunday evening by the church people and an invitation extended to all to come and hear the pending issue for and against the licensing of saloons in Estacada discussed. The meeting was presided over by Rev. Kuhlman who announced that they were there to enter their protest against the granting of licenses and to hear from anyone who had any good trait of the liquor business to defend. He said that it was not his purpose to abuse anyone and gave an opportunity for anyone wishing to defend the saloon the first opportunity to talk and granting a limit of ten minutes for anyone to be heard. No one appearing, speakers who were against the licensing of saloons took the floor and gave their version and ideas of the saloon business. Demov, Conklin, Calif, Epperson, Whitcomb and Kuhlman were those who spoke against the business and L. E. Belfils made explanations in reference to the attitude of the Council and business men and also tried to correct some of the misleading statements that had been made.

It was held by the people of Garfield that they had a right to a voice in the Estacada vote to be taken, and based their opinion on the fact that they are a part of our voting precinct. The meeting was well attended and the room crowded. Many women of the town and country were present. The citizens' men and the editor of

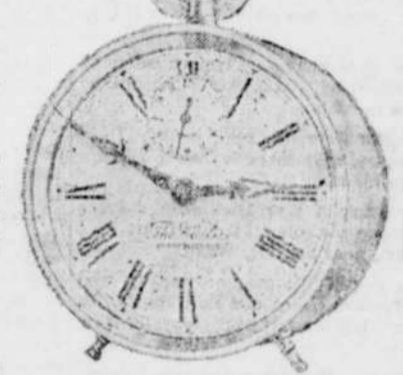
