The fishing in and about Estacada is very good at the present time. Early in the season fishermen were not so successful as they are now.

In the game of ball Estacada vs The Coffee Kings of Portland, on the local diamond Sunday the score was 10 to 4 in favor of the local team.

In the game at Eagle Creek on Sunday the Eagle Creek team won against the Portland Giants, score 7 to 5. The largest crowd of the season greeted the players and much enthusiasm was indulged in by the "fans."

Yocum & Hayes, millmen from Garfield have been hauling to Estacada for sometime three inch plank and stacking them up at the old wood working plant. They loaded these plank this week for points in Iowa.

The new extension to the siding on the west side of the depot has been completed and shippers of wood and ties are taking advantage of it at once and piling up stacks of ties ready for shipment.

The dance given by the Fraternal Brotherhood proved to be a fine dance, everybody had a good time and there was fine order. The floor was managed by Harry Eckles and Ray Hamilton. These dances will be continued once a month.

Interested Crowd Gathers

A delegation from the Fruit Grower's Association met with members of the Commercial Club on Monday evening to listen to proposed plans for publicity work for Estacada and vicinity. This would include Garfield, Currinsville, George, Cazadero, Springwater, Dodge and Elwood. Mr. Wells of Portland who represents the Harriman railroad system in publicity work, was the speaker. He vividly portrayed his methods of boosting for a community which so appealed to those who heard him that the mere raising of a few thousand dollars only looked like thirteen cents.

Speaks Well Of Estacada

W. R. Wilhelm, engineer of sewers and bridges of Portland, and Chas. J. Stirdi his assistant, and E. F. Wilson were Estacada visitors on Sunday. In conversation with the Progress man relative to the city of Estacada's intended street and sewer construction Mr. Wilhelm had much to say favorable to Estacada and its surroundings, also of the benefit to be derived from a system of good sewerage. He said that we need not feel grieved over the fact that our advertised bonds did not find a ready market, as the larger cities were experiencing the same conditions and that money was scarce and bond buyers were extremely careful at the present time. He thinks Estacada will be the city of Eastern Clackamas and lauded our city as being aggressive, beautiful and a splendid place to spend even a very warm Sunday and he was unusually delighted with the exceptionally good and cool water to be obtained at the spring in the Park. Such cooling draughts he emphatically declared was a sufficiently good reason for Portlanders to make weekly trips to Estacada.

City Wins Near Beer Cases

In the case of the City vs J. M. Foster and J. P. Altizer arrested and tried before the City Recorder for violating a city ordinance in selling near beer without a license, the cases were tried out on Friday.

Neither of the defendants denied the selling of near beer but pleaded "not guilty" for the reason that they believed the city had no authority to prevent their selling it. The city was represented by E. W. Bartlett and Henry F. Joslin and the defendants by J. B. Hosford. Technical points of law were raised by the defense in a demurrer on four contentions which was overruled. The case was closed at 3:00 P. M. and the Recorder reserved his decision until Monday. One of the defendants being unable to be present Monday, requested that he be permitted to appear Tuesday, which was granted. The decision was "guilty as charged" and the fine placed at fifty dollars each, which was paid.

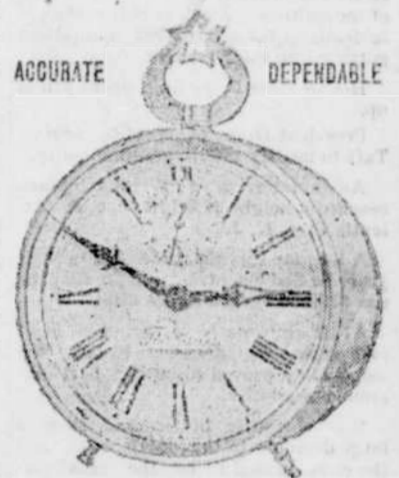
