Contract Let For New School Addition

District In Good Financial Condition—New Building To Cost \$5,685

The school directors of Estacada District 108 at their meeting held on Monday to receive bids for the construction of a new school building, received two bids, one from Al Lindsey, his bid being \$6,110, and the other from J. W. Gussaulis of Portland at \$5,685. The latter was awarded the contract.

The building will be erected on the north side of the present school building and will be a separate building but joined to the old building by a hallway that will have floors on the same level. It has been thought by building separate better light and less danger from roof complications will be secured. The new building is to be a duplicate of the old and will be 41x58 feet in dimension containing four rooms, one room 40x50 will be made so that in case the schools desire to hold special entertainment or exercises they will have room to do so in the building. Provision also is made to install at once a heating system, as it is believed this can be done at this time at a much less cost. The contract price does not include the heating system that will be an additional expenditure. It is believed that in all including furnishings the outlay on expense to the district will be about \$7,000.

We have one of the best districts with an increasing valuation that will guarantee a permanent revenue to maintain the high standard of the district already established by the directors. We now have in this school district a great deal of the railroad valuations from power plants and other improvements and these, in a couple of years by the addition of the River Mill power site will enable the district to cancel their bonded indebtedness. Those who fear high taxes from bonded indebtedness will in a few years be agreeably surprised, is our prediction.

Young Man Dies Of Tuberculosis

Chester R. Ingram died on Saturday morning July 16th at the home of his sister Mrs. D. S. Fleming after a short illness. Chester was a young man, well liked by those who knew him since his short stay in Estacada. He was helper with Mr. Fleming during the time the latter was agent for the P. R. L. & P. Co. and came with Fleming from Eagle Creek when he moved here, which was about six months ago. He was not strong and he soon found it necessary to give up his position on account of failing health. In some manner he had contracted tuberculosis, which was the cause of his death. He was only confined to his bed for about one week.

Chester R. Ingram was born at Hillsboro, Ore., and at the time of his death was aged 19 years and 19 days. He is survived by his father L. W. Ingram and three sisters, Mrs. Myrtle Fleming, Miss Mable and Sadie Ingram. They all make their home with Mr. Fleming. Services were conducted at the home by Rev. Kuhlman and interment was made at Mt. Zion Cemetery on Sunday.
