The correct way to pronounce it is Es-ta-ca-da, accent on the third syllable, a having the sound of a as in ah in the two last syllables.

On next Tuesday the city is to vote on five amendments to the city charter. Those who are familiar with conditions need no explanation, but we desire to give in as few words as possible what the council desires to remedy at this special election.

As it is now all of the officers terms of office expire at the same time. This is very bad for the best interests of the city. It brings into the management of the city's affairs men who have no knowledge of contemplated business of the old council and leaves no one, except by re-election, who is familiar with what was done by them. Now, as we have five councilmen it would be much better to have the terms of two expire and retain three, etc. This would always keep men in office familiar with the business of the council. The reason it was necessary to increase the term from two to four years was because it could not be done by a two year term in this way unless elections were held every year.

The charter now makes it imperative for the council to pay the city marshal a salary. If they had a choice of paying an officer either by the fee plan or salary it would be much better. Then when the services would not justify paying a salary the officer could be paid by fee.

It requires a residence in the city for six months before an election to be able to vote. Sixty days is plenty of time to safeguard any municipal election.

One of the necessary things to keep the city's credit and aggressiveness up is to have sufficient money to do it with. The charter does not allow of levying more than a five mill tax. This is not a sufficient amount to meet even a very economic administration. It would not produce a revenue of seven hundred dollars. The assessed valuation is \$145,000. This at five mills would give \$725 but delinquencies and discounts for prompt payment would bring the amount to less than seven hundred dollars per annum. A maximum of ten mills would make a very moderate tax and no one would be hurt much by it. If the occasion did not demand a levy of ten mills it would not be made. The requirements of the city demand a greater revenue than can be secured from a five mill levy. It will be necessary for the credit of the city to devise some way to raise this needed revenue. As taxation is one of the ways, the council hopes the voters will look at this in a business way and not tie their hands thus preventing them from meeting the cities just obligations.

The clause in reference to the marshal working the poll tax money as he sees fit is an arbitrary rule. As the people place confidence sufficient in the councilmen to direct the expenditure of all the other city money it is hard to reason why it was not intended that they direct it also. Consequently to change that provision of the charter so that this money is spent under the direction of the council is deemed to be a wise provision.

Portland's Autumn livestock show and race meet on the Country Club grounds will be known as the Harvest Festival, and the biggest purse ever offered in the Pacific Northwest for a single race will be hung up. It will be \$10,000 and will be known as the bankers' purse. Another, offered by the hotel men, will be \$5,000. Many smaller prizes will be offered and it is believed the festival will attract a larger gathering than any similar meet held in this part of the country.
