The correct way to pronounce it is Es-ta-ca-da, accent on the third syllable, a having the sound of a as in ah in the two last syllables.

We desire to call the attention of voters to the necessity of registering and of doing so at once. The law makes it necessary for a voter to register for every election, as it is from this registration the registered list of voters is made. Unless your name appears on the registry, should you be entitled to vote, it is necessary to secure six freeholders to make affidavit to these facts, which is always more annoying than to do so by being registered.

Any notary public or justice of the peace is authorized to register your name when requested by you to do so without cost to yourself. The time for registering is any time prior to ten days before the primary election at which time registration is closed until after the primaries are held, after which if for any reason you have not been registered the same can be done before the regular election.

In order to vote at the primaries it is necessary not only to be registered but to be on record as being affiliated with a distinct party. Let everyone entitled to vote see to it that his name is on the list.

The 4th annual picnic of United Commercial Travelers under Oregon Council No. 84 of Portland will be held in the Park at Estacada on August 6th. As the commercial men of the country are great advertisers for any community we would suggest to our business men and individuals also the importance of decorating their places of business and putting on our best appearance as a business proposition.

We are sure that no class of men, as a class, are more observing than commercial travelers. They are going to say things about us when they go away. Why not give them an opportunity of saying good things of us and our city. This they will do if we do things intended to attract their attention and make them at home with us and treat them as if we were glad they came here and that we want them to come again.

Oregon's apple show will be held in Portland November 30 to December 2. It will be a great exposition of the state's fruit-growing possibilities and it will be of wide interest because of Oregon's fame as the home of the red apple. There promises to be exhibits entered in competition for prizes from every apple growing county in the state. The Corvallis Commercial Club has already offered \$100 for the best apple exhibits from Benton County and the Hood River Commercial Club has offered \$50 for prizes for the best apples shown from that section. Other counties will yet be heard from in the same way.

The visit to Western Oregon of Dr. Bernhard Boeggild, the dairy expert of the University of Copenhagen, during the week was important. Dr. Boeggild said conditions in Western Oregon are ideal for dairying and this section can surpass the world in this industry. He said dairying is sadly neglected here. Illustrating this, he said Denmark, whose total area is but 11,000 square miles, has a dairy industry yielding \$54,000,000 in butter exports. He thinks Western Oregon can at least double Denmark's present production.

Forty-two million bushels of wheat is the estimated crop of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, according to an authority here who has completed a trip through the grain sections. He finds that Ore-

Brave Fire Fighters Make Heroes Of Themselves In Fire In Garfield—Careless Fireman Puts Out Fire

At 7:30 A. M. Tuesday morning the calls of "Fire" "Fire" "Help" "Help" reverberated through the valleys, wood and orchard lands of the peaceful section of Garfield and the "distress," "alarm" and "last call of the wounded" signals were ringing over the telephones for the Coyd Looney home was on fire.
