The East wind began blowing on Wednesday and it is feared that the forest fires here that had been thought out of danger will again be troublesome.

Lee J. Caulfield, Democratic candidate for nomination of county surveyor, called at the Progress on Wednesday.

Henry Cowan who recently moved into Heylman's house, while cutting wood at his home accidentally cut his leg. Dr. Adix took several stitches to close the wound.

A two year old child of Henry Cromer of Springwater, in some manner received ptomaine poisoning last week. The little one has been very seriously ill but is thought to be improving.

Forest Fires Prove To Be Quite Serious

Local Fires Have Not Done Very Much Damage

The forest fire situation throughout the entire Northwest has not improved during the week. Fires are raging in Washington, Idaho and Oregon, British Columbia and other states. The loss of life has been great and the property loss almost incalculable. Wide areas of the National Reserves with their valuable standing timber have been destroyed, as have been the cities, ranch and homesteader property in the path of the raging fires. The forest reserve men and volunteer fire fighters have been unable to stay the fires destructiveness. The War Department has sent a number of soldiers to aid in fighting these fires. They have been successful in saving property, but as yet have not been able to stop the fire. It is feared unless rain comes to the aid of those who are trying to stay its ravages much damage will yet be done.

In our local forest fire not much damage resulted except in the expense incurred in preventing the spread. The expense to the P. R. L. & P. Co. as well as to the volunteers who turned out en masse to prevent the fire from spreading would make the slashing that was being burned when the fire started, a very costly property if all this expense were charged to its account.

This part of the Cascade Forest Reserve has had no fires this season H. Mendenhall, the ranger in charge, has been very watchful and his territory well patrolled and this prevention is less costly than to fight it out after the fire starts.

Fire Does Much Damage

Thursday morning.—The fire situation locally has become very serious and many homes of ranchers were burned yesterday afternoon and last night. The last car from Portland to Estacada was an hour and a half late in getting here owing to the forest fire being so close to the track that it was not safe.

The fire at Anderson and Boring has done much damage and burned a lot of cordwood. The high wind that commenced blowing yesterday has continued and is still blowing, which is increasing the danger all the time.

A fire that started on Wild Cat Mountain north of Eagle Creek yesterday afternoon spread with such rapidity that people in the Palmateer settlement could see to read by the light of the fire which had extended in the afternoon to a line twenty-five miles long and sweeping everything before it. The telephone lines are down and it is very hard to get correct information. At Dover it is reported that Guy Woodie lost his house and barn. Mr. Lightner lost his house and barn; Mr. Uptegrade had two barns burned. At Firwood road plank and buildings are reported burned. At Sandy the situation is bad and the town is reported burned. Wires are down and we are unable to get correct reports.
