Fierce Fires Rage in California. Chico, Cal.-Fanned by a heavy wind, forest fires are doing much damage in California. Twenty miles from here, in Chico canyon, a fierce fire is raging, traveling at a terrific speed. The flames jumped two and one-half miles in 15 minutes. Stirling City mills have closed and the men are fighting the flames. Fires along Freeman's creek are menacing the Sequoia National park and the giant national forest, containing some of the largest and oldest trees in the world.
