

### ESTACADA PROGRESS

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The correct way to pronounce it is Es-ta-ca-da, accent on the third syllable, a having the sound of a as in ah in the two last syllables.

The readers of the Progress, together with other voters of the state, will be called upon at the November election to act upon thirty-two measures. The changes they propose if carried will in some cases be radical from the laws now existing. It is the duty of every voter to inform himself of these measures so that on the day of election he can be able to vote intelligently. The secretary of state has sent to every registered voter a list of these measures. We also believe that it is the few who will carefully study them and realize that their vote on these measures will aid in making good or bad laws to govern us by. We believe the average intelligence of the masses is capable of making as good laws as the average legislature, should such means of informing ones self be taken advantage of. The majority of voters put aside these grave questions until the day of election and then vote as someone tells them or at random, just as it happens to appear to them at the moment. If such be the methods employed in making our laws it won't be long until it will be discovered that the initiative method of enactment is a failure. It is important that every voter look carefully over these thirty-two measures and the arguments as presented, as well as note other opinions just as any intelligent man would attempt to learn all he could about any other matter he was interested in. These are the measures:

Woman suffrage.  
Constitutional convention.  
Separate Senatorial and legislative districts.  
Abolishing constitutional provision for equal and uniform taxation.  
Permitting each county to regulate taxation and exemption, and abolishing poll-tax.  
Bonding the state by districts to build or purchase railroads.  
Classification of property for purposes of taxation.  
Annexing part of Washington county to Multnomah.  
Prohibition.  
Giving cities and towns power to control and regulate liquor traffic.  
Prohibiting taking of fish from Rogue river except by hook and line.  
Providing a method of creating new counties.  
Road bonding by counties.  
Amending primary law to pay fare and expenses of delegates to National convention.  
Creating six new counties.  
Re-establishing three Normal schools.  
Annexing part of Clackamas to Multnomah.  
Employers' liability law.  
Creating commission to study question of employers' liability.  
Creating people's inspectors of Government.  
Proportional representation in Legislature.  
Reorganizing jury system.

An organization that promises to do much for Oregon, Washington and Idaho fruit is the Northwest Fruit Exchange, W. F. Gwin, Manager, with office in the Spalding, Portland, Working in co-operation with the various associations of growers throughout the three states, the exchange is directing shipments and seeking a wider market. It is planned to carry on a campaign similar to that waged by the California Orange growers and every wholesale house in the fruit trade will be reached through the exchange.

An evil that will be combated is the formation of pools among the large buyers so that prices will not be under the control of these agencies. Another plan is to ship nothing less than carload lots direct

to the wholesaler. In this way it is thought the consumer will receive the benefit in the saving of freight rates by avoiding small and expensive shipments. Manager Gwin is determined that world-wide markets for Oregon fruit shall become a reality and predicts that instead of overproduction calling a halt on orchard acreage, it will soon be necessary to double the present commercial orchard area in the Northwest.

The 25th premium list for the All Oregon Fruit Show by the Oregon State Horticultural Society is just out. It contains a very large list of premiums ranging from \$100 down. The management desires to have every fruit district represented. It is an opportunity for our local fruit growers to boost for our district that should be taken advantage of. Our district is new and cannot be expected to make a large display, but we can make plate displays and otherwise call attention to the district at a small expense. The display has outgrown its former exhibition quarters in the Meier & Frank store and will be held at the Army Nov. 30th, Dec. 1st and 2nd, Portland, Ore. Anyone interested can see the premium list at the Progress office.

A movement to stimulate hog production in the Northwest is to be started at a conference of experiment station directors, railroad officials and livestock experts to be held in Spokane October 4. Ways and means to interest farmers in raising more hogs for market will be discussed and it is hoped to start a campaign that will result in a much increased quantity of hogs for the livestock packers. This plan is expected to add very much to the wealth of the three states. Robert Withycombe, superintendent of the Union Experiment Station, will be the Oregon representative.

Mount Hood will be enclosed within a national reserve if the petitions now being circulated for signatures accomplish their purpose. With its snow-capped peaks great glaciers and dashing torrents, this mountain can be made a great national playground, easily accessible from Portland, where thousands of people may seek recreation each summer. It is sought to have the same plan followed as has been done in creating the Mount Rainier reserve.

The Grange Fair opens at Gresham on Sept. 29 and continues until Oct. 2nd. They have an interesting daily program. Greater interest is being shown this year by those having articles to exhibit in making entry of them. Arrangements have been made to secure the Rosebrook sixteen-piece band. This insures good music for the fair.

The rapid growth of our schools as outlined in this issue is but evidence of the change and growth of Estacada. This change is going on in such a steady manner that those of us who have seen it all scarcely realize the importance of it.

### Apple Exhibit To Be Held Here

It has been decided by the Estacada Commercial Club to have an apple exhibit at the Commercial Club rooms next month. This is for the purpose of stimulating our people in their effort to have better fruit. The offer is open to any Eastern Clackamas grower. The following prizes are offered and the only conditions required will be that the apples be grown in Eastern Clackamas county also the prize winning apples be left with the Club for exhibiting purposes. The prizes are: 1st prize for the best 3 boxes \$15; 2nd prize for the best 3 boxes \$10; 3rd prize for the best three boxes \$5; 1st prize for the best single box \$5; 2nd prize for the best single box \$3; 3rd prize for the best single box \$1.

The apples are to be brought to the Commercial Club room between Oct. 15th and Nov. 1st and a date to be set later for judging these exhibits will be announced. Competent judges will decide the merits of the exhibits sent in and any apples not taking prizes will be subject to the will of the exhibitor to dispose of as he sees fit. We hope to see a good display made.

Wood Too Hard to Burn.

There are certain kinds of wood that are too hard to burn or refuse to ignite for some other reason, such as iron-wood and the good brier root, but it is a curiosity to come across a piece of common deal - the soft, light wood of which so many boxes are made - that cannot be set fire to. The piece of wood in question was common white deal from Sweden, but was remarkable for its comparative weight. It had formed part of a boat belonging to a whaler and had been dragged below the surface of the water to the depth of more than half a mile by a harpooned whale.
