## Death Of Mrs. Mary E. Ely

Mrs. Mary E. Ely, wife of J. B. Ely deceased, died at her home in Currinsville on Monday, Nov. 14th, after an illness of about ten days. She had an attack of pneumonia, from which she had recovered, but owing to her advanced age was not able to regain her former strength.

Her maiden name was Mary E. Krieger and she was born at Hagerstown, Maryland, April 23, 1831 and at the time of her death was aged 79 years, 6 months and 21 days. She was married to J. B. Ely January 11th, 1855. They came to Heppner, Ore., in 1884 from Iowa. They resided there until the death of her husband, which occurred April 14, 1894. In 1897 Mrs. Ely moved to Mt. Zion where she lived for a short time, then moving to Currinsville where she has since resided. She joined the M. E. Church at Mt. Zion in 1898, transferring from the Lutheran church of which she had formerly been a member.

She was the mother of eight children, six of whom survive her, two having died in infancy. The surviving children are Mrs. Ista Bauernfeind, who lived with her mother; Geo. D. Ely, Gardena, Cal.; Mrs. F. Walters, of Fort Madison, Iowa; Mrs. C. J. Wilson, of Ocean Park, Colo.; J. K. Ely, of Currinsville, Ore., and Mrs. S. P. Wilson, of Ione, Ore. All the children were present at the time of her death, except Geo. D. Ely and Mrs. C. J. Wilson. She has also 17 grand children.

Funeral services were held in the M. E. Church at Currinsville on Wednesday at 2 P. M., conducted by Rev. Browne. The body was taken to Heppner, where interment will be made.

She was a member of the Eastern Star. A long and useful life is ended. Her work is finished.

## Governor Issues Proclamation

SALEM, OR., Nov. 15—Governor F. W. Benson this morning issued the annual Thanksgiving proclamation in the following words:

"Thanksgiving Proclamation: 'In accordance with' the time-honored custom of setting apart one day in the year in remembrance of blessings vouchsafed to us by Almighty God, and in conformity with the proclamation of William Howard Taft, President of the United States, I, F. W. Benson, Governor of the State of Oregon, by authority in me vested, do hereby designate Thursday, November 24, as Thanksgiving day, and I earnestly recommend that upon that day the people of this state desist from their usual vocations and repair to their respective places of worship, there to give grateful thanks to Almighty God for his goodness and loving kindness to us and to all mankind.

"I further recommend, as a fitting observance of the day, that out of our abundance we remember the poor and destitute amongst us, and that by deeds of mercy and charity we make it an occasion of comfort and happiness to others. Let us also devote the day to the enjoyment of hospitality and the strengthening of family ties; to inspiring sentiments of loyalty to our country and respect for its laws and institutions.

"In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of the state to be hereunto affixed. Done at the Capitol, Salem, Oregon, this 15th day of November, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and ten."

## Buy 40 Acres To Plat

Mr. A. E. Sparks has just closed a deal whereby he becomes the owner of the east 40 acres of the O. S. Mathews ranch. Mr. Sparks informs us that he will build a road through the property and pipe the water from an elegant spring on the hillside down to the property which he will have platted in five and ten acre tracts and placed on the market. This opens a splendid piece of level tracts on the south side of the river and will be close in property for the purchasers and when cleared up will add materially to Estacada's close-in country property.

## Have Leased Saw Mill

E. M. Miller and Al Lindsey have leased the saw mill on the Brown place west of Currinsville and will go into the lumbering business. It is their intention to build a tram road of about one mile and a quarter to a point on the P. R. L. & P. Co.'s line between Currinsville and Alspangh. They will haul everything they cut at the mill direct to the railroad, where it will be either shipped or piled. There is quite a good lot of timber in that locality which we believe can be profitably handled in the manner proposed.

## Fine Apples On Display

The exhibit of apples in the Estacada Pharmacy windows is attracting considerable attention from visitors to Estacada, as well as local people. It is not nearly so large as the promoters of the apple show desired it should be. The apples are a fair sample of what we grow now and an index to our

possibilities in that line. We believe it marks the beginning of greater interest in fruit culture and care. Even this exhibit could right now be improved by the ideas obtained from it.
