New School Building Is Dedicated

Fine Program Is Rendered By School Children; Dr. Todd Makes Eloquent Address; Supt. Gary Speaks

Principal Says More Room Needed Soon

Prin. James Gives Figures To Show Remarkable School Growth; New Addition Will Soon Be Filled

The dedication of the new school building in Estacada took place on last Friday evening. State Superintendent Alderman who was to speak, was called unexpectedly to Salt Lake and could not be present, and sickness in his family prevented Pres. Homan from being present. He sent Vice Pres. Todd in his stead.

The evenings program was opened by Principal Howard James in a neat introductory, welcoming the people to this dedicatory service and commending the educational spirit manifest in this district, which he said was the best he had met with anywhere. He also said there were enrolled at the present time 200 pupils; that there are more boys in school now than there were pupils two years ago; that grades 3 and 4 had 55 scholars and 5 and 6 had 44 in actual attendance in these rooms, showing that additional rooms and teachers would soon be needed. There are now six teachers employed.

After his remarks Rachael Reed rendered a piano solo, followed by a song from the children of the primary room.

County Superintendent Gary was then introduced and gave his usually interesting talk on his observance of school conditions, not forgetful of the interest manifested in this district, which he has before complimented us for. He said further that we were not the only ones. Stone collects an 8 mill tax to maintain a high school fund and Oak Grove levies 24 mills to support her schools while we are fortunate in being able to sustain our high educational standard on a 4 mill tax.

A solo was then sung by Dorothy Miller. An exercise given in Indian club swinging by Lena Harkenrider and a vocal solo by Mildred Ferry followed.

Dr. Todd was then introduced and made the address of the evening. His subject was, "An Education. What for?" Big things was practically the answer. The speaker pointed out the growth to big things educationally, intellectually, morally and physically.

The high school yells, given by the high school and led by Milton Evans, lent spice to the evenings entertainment. After the speaker had concluded, A. W. Cook of Damascus came forward and offered the baskets that had been brought by the young ladies, to the highest bidder. Myrtle Woodlee's basket brought the most money. Ten dollars being bid for it.

A pleasant social time was enjoyed during the disposal of the numerous baskets. The sum of \$86.90 was realized from them. It was almost midnight before the assembly dispersed.

Prizes Are Awarded For Best Apples

First Display Of Eastern Clackamas Apples Shows High Grade Fruit

On Saturday the judges appointed to determine who had contributed the best apples to Estacada's first apple show met at 4 P. M. and made examination of those on exhibition. E. L. Wonaocott, John Stormer and D. S. Fleming were the judges. They did not know to whom the apples belonged they were judging, as the boxes were known by numbers. As a guide to judge by, 100 points were divided as follows: 25 for packing, 25 free from blemish, 20 color, 15 size, 15 uniformity of size. They examined the boxes and gave

credits. When those entered in the three box class were reported it was found that No. 2, V. Lingelbach, had the highest number of points, 247½, and won first prize \$15. No. 4, E. J. Stevens, 232½ points, 2nd prize \$10 and No. 6, N. M. Tracy, 220 points, 3rd prize \$5. For the single box contest Standish brothers had 97½ points and won 1st prize \$5. They also had 87½ points and won 2nd prize \$3. W. F. Crain had 67 points and won 3rd \$1.

The exhibit consisted of 17 full boxes, two parts of boxes and a few plate exhibits. It was much smaller than it should have been, but was sufficient to show what can be done. We had much better apples than was the ability to display what we did have, or pack them properly. A few fairly well packed boxes were exhibited, but most of them did not show much taste in packing. Color, in the apple displayed, was remarked upon and those familiar with good apples in the Hood River and other regions say ours compare favorably with any seen anywhere. Size, color and free from blemish were points well spoken of by those who examined the exhibit.

We predict that by another year greater interest will be manifested in our exhibit and we are satisfied this one has surprised us by showing what we really do produce. We have the soil and other conditions favorable for a fruit district. With experience in packing and the care given our young orchards in a few years we can surprise ourselves by our apple show.
