Good Meeting Held

At the Fruit Grower's Assn. assembly in the I. O. O. F. Hall on Saturday a fairly good turnout of members was present. The meeting was presided over by Pres. Stokes. Various standing committees made their report, after which the County Fruit Inspector was introduced and gave a very instructive talk. Mr. Lewis paid high tribute to our soil and lands for fruit growing. His theme being principally how to care for the growing of fruit trees and fruit. He described the kind and best time to spray.

C. C. Chapman, secretary of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, was then introduced. The hall was not very warm nor was the assembly very demonstrative. Chapman requested them to make a noise with their feet and clap with their hands as a means of warming up, which was done. The inspiration from this simple act was felt over the entire assembly. Mr. Chapman spoke highly of Estacada and its opportunities, referring especially to our splendid agricultural and fruit lands and their development. He condemned the lack of "boost spirit" in Estacada and gave the dormant Commercial Club a very hard rap. His enthusiasm in his work was well exemplified in his advice and the energy he used to induce all to get together and advertise our community.

Case Set Aside

In a case of the City of Estacada vs. J. M. Foster tried by a jury before the City Recorder on Tuesday, Foster was found guilty of selling beer without a license and fined one hundred dollars. J. B. Hosford, attorney for Foster, demanded a jury trial by juryman drawn from the jury box. There never has been such a jury list in the city, this being the first knowledge any of the city officials have that such list should exist. The case was tried in the usual way. On Wednesday Atty. Cross for the city asked to have the verdict set aside for the reason that the demand of the defendant to be tried by a jury drawn from a jury list was correct. Such jury list cannot be had until after the first Monday in January, consequently the case against Foster will be continued until after that date.
