Special City Election February 4th

Petition Asking for a Vote on Liquor License Question is Granted by Council

At a meeting of the City Council held on Tuesday evening a petition from the citizens of Estacada was presented requesting them to call a special election as soon as possible to have the question of a majority either for or against the granting of liquor licenses decided. The petition had been hastily prepared and contained eighty-one signatures showing the interest manifested in the question. The Council was slow about acting on the petition and the session lasted until almost twelve o'clock before a decision was reached. The Council finally voted unanimously in favor of ordering the election. The strong petition of that number of names from a list of voters totalizing about one hundred and twenty votes was considered by the Council to indicate a public sentiment to have the issue settled. For the last couple of years this has been a very annoying question to the men the citizens have elected to serve them. It has been an unpleasant duty gratuitously performed by the councilmen who have done what they deemed best for good government. An ordinance calling the special election on Saturday February 4th was passed.
