Wide interest and confidence in Oregon throughout the East was noticed by Theodore B. Wilcox, president of the Oregon Development League, who has just returned from a business trip. He found the railroads are advertising Oregon extensively and expects this, in connection with the other work along similar lines, will bring a flood of settlers. Mr. Wilcox found the belief general throughout the East that the completion of the Panama Canal will be of great benefit to the Pacific Coast.

Mr. Wilcox showed the pride he feels in his state when he said: "On my trip I passed through Virginia, the Carolinas and Georgia. I do not hesitate to say I would not give the poorest acre in the whole Northwest for ten of the best in that section of the country, that is, for agricultural purposes."

The new railroads up the Deschutes River into Interior Oregon are going forward at a rapid rate and are both practically ready for trains for a distance of 71 miles from the mouth of the river. The Harriman line expects to reach the 82nd milepost by February 1, leaving 51 miles to be built to Redmond. It is expected this will be accomplished in May. The Hill road will probably be completed as far as Bend early next Summer.

United States engineers have officially approved the project for a 30-foot channel to the sea from Portland and they recommend an appropriation of \$520,000 for starting the work. The officials contemplate the dredging and maintenance of a channel 30 feet deep and 300 wide. This will be far easier, it is believed, than was the original improvement of the river, which has been deepened from 17 to 27 feet at low tide.

The first annual Pacific Northwest Livestock Show will be held in Portland March 20, 21 and 22. It will be an exhibit of fat stock, patterned after similar shows held in the packing centers of the Middle West. It will be of great educational value to those interested in livestock and will aid in the extension of the industry in the Northwest. The show has the backing of the livestock interests as well as the active support of James J. Hill and others interested in the development of this section of the country.

Hardware and farm implement dealers of the state will assemble in Portland for their annual convention on January 24-27. Trade questions will be discussed and problems that confront the merchants will be solved. Parcels Post will come up for consideration and other vexed matters will be untangled.

Hunt Says Bills No Good

Road Supervisor Gives Views And Figures In Reference To State Aid

To the Editor:

In your issue of December 29th you take Road Dist. 49 to task for passing a resolution protesting against the enacting of the State Highway bills as proposed by the Oregon Good Roads Association and for not building more roads than we can pay for with a reasonable yearly tax. This you claim is a mistake, claiming it retards needed improvement.

The truth of the matter is that "State Aid" as proposed in this act is not "State Aid" at all. It is simply the eight wealthier counties of the state taxing themselves to help build roads in the 26 counties that would not pay in \$20,000 each in the 2 years. Clackamas county would pay in more than \$20,000 and in order to get back \$20,000 she must put up \$40,000 cash and provide all needed machinery, tools etc.

Then the proposed laws say, "after having so provided such fund the county court shall select the particular location of the roads to be constructed. Such roads shall begin at one of the principal market places in the county or shall connect with a permanent road leading to such place, and shall be so located as that when constructed as herein provided, it will constitute one of the main traveled roads to the place from whence it starts."

Now note carefully the following "All roads constructed under the provisions of this act shall be constructed by and under the exclusive direction and control of the State Highway Commissioner." Now, Mr. Editor, tell us wherein state aid can or will be of any benefit to us. It is not necessary to levy a prohibitive tax to improve our roads and pay for them as we go, instead of going in debt.

It is an undeniable fact that the best constructed roads require resurfacing every 8 to 10 years, oftener than this if not properly looked after, so the future property owner will have plenty to pay for. Won't it pay us better to have a good local tax all of which is expended on the roads in our own district than a smaller tax spent on roads in some other part of the country or state?

If the country surrounding Estacada is not developed until we get roads built by "State Aid" as proposed we will have one long while to wait.

"The Lord helps those that help themselves." You say it would be a good business proposition to borrow money to build good and permanent roads. To put the roads of Clackamas county in this condition would require an outlay of at least \$8,000,000. The interest on this would be at least \$400,000 yearly requiring a tax levy of 20 mills on present valuation to meet this expense alone. To properly maintain these good roads would require at least another \$500,000 yearly. Of course, these items can be materially lowered if good roads are built in one section of the county only and the whole county taxed to pay for them. Would this be a square deal to all? The great trouble is that the road proposition has been neglected so long that now the country is so rapidly being developed that we have a serious problem to solve. In this connection allow me to quote the following from the report of Mr. S. P. Hooker, chairman of the New York State Highway Commission. "The cost of maintenance of improved highways is a most serious one. If our theories are correct as to what should be done to keep these roads in perfect condition, and nothing but perfect condition is now satisfactory to the traveling public, we

must expect to expend from \$300 to \$400 per mile for regular maintenance and then allow from \$4,000 to \$6,000 per mile for resurfacing at periods of 8 to 10 years. This will make a cost of from \$700 to \$900 per mile extending over a series of years. Assuming that the state of New York will have 4000 miles of roadway within three years this means that for maintenance alone the state must expend annually \$3,000,000.

Now as Oregon is a little larger than New York what can we expect on an appropriation of \$680,000 in 2 years?

Borrowing money to build good roads is an entirely different proposition from that of borrowing to build railroads and kindred enterprises. In the latter case there is a reasonable prospect of a direct cash income on the investment with which to meet interest, operating expenses, etc., and eventually pay off the debt. With good roads there is no cash return and all expenses must be paid by a direct tax on the people of the county that borrows the money. Oregon is a large state with so many local conditions to be considered that it can not be compared with some of the extreme eastern states.

State aid in an advisory way would be a good thing for Oregon but state aid as proposed will be a detriment.
