## Serious Accident

### Near Barton

A serious accident happened on  
Tuesday afternoon at trestle bridge  
No. 19 on the O. W. P. which re-  
sulted in the death of a man and  
his wife. The trestle is about 200  
feet long and spans Deep Creek.  
The man was a wood chopper em-  
ployed by C. Z. Lake. He and his  
wife were about the center of the  
trestle when Conductor Adams  
work train came suddenly upon  
them. The motorman, thinking  
they were workmen who have been  
repairing since the high water and  
who when a train approaches step  
down on one of the bench supports,  
did not discover his mistake until  
too late. The couple attempted to  
crouch by the side of the track but  
were knocked off and fell to the  
rocky creek bed, a distance of about  
60 feet. The woman was instant-  
ly killed and the man died while  
being taken to the hospital at Port-  
land.

## Young Man Dies Of Pneumonia

Just entering young manhood  
Neil L. Gordon was suddenly called  
by death at the age of nineteen  
years on Thursday last. Neil, as  
he was familiarly called by his  
friends had just recently recovered  
from a six weeks illness of typhoid  
and was just commencing to get  
about nicely when he was taken  
down by pneumonia. It was  
thought better to take him to St.  
Vincent's Hospital in Portland that  
he might have the best attention  
possible. He only survived the  
attack nine days however. He is  
survived by his mother Mrs. Laura  
A. Benjamin of Dodge and two  
brothers Rex C. of Colton and  
Harold L. of Estacada, also one  
sister Mrs. Mable A. Benjamin.

He was elected at the last meet-  
ing of the Estacada Fire Depart-  
ment a member of that company  
and the pallbearers at his funeral  
were six of his firemen associates.  
Interment was made on Friday at  
the Springwater Cemetery. Rev.  
Darling was the minister in charge.

## Robbery And Fire

Samuel Beary, of 323 Morrison  
St., Portland, last week met with  
serious loss by what is reported to  
be burglary and fire. His place had  
a safe but this had been three times  
before broken open and robbed. He  
had, since the last robbery, left it  
open and kept his money in a tin  
box which was hid in an out of the  
way place. On Friday night he  
neglected to hide the box. It con-  
tained about \$200 in money, \$80 of  
which belonged to the Knights of  
Pythias of which order he was  
treasurer. This was gone and the  
building discovered on fire. He re-  
ports his loss at \$7,000 on his stock  
of goods in addition to the money  
loss. He is the owner of the build-  
ing in Estacada occupied by Mr.  
Waterbury.

## 700,000,000 Feet Of Timber Burned

Washington, January 31.—Re-  
ports based on detailed field exami-  
nations made by National Forest  
officers, of the lands burned over in  
the forest fires of last summer in  
Washington and Oregon, which  
have been received by the U. S.  
Department of Agriculture, show  
that the national forest timber loss  
in these states is about 700,000,000  
feet. This is somewhat less than  
was indicated by the provisional  
estimates made shortly after the  
fires. The reports also show the  
importance, as a means of protect-  
ing the forests against fires, of the  
efforts which are being made by the  
Department to open new range to  
stockmen.
