The correct way to pronounce it is Es-ta-ca-da, accent on the third syllable, a having the sound of a as in ah in the two last syllables.

Railroad rates cost from a cent and a half to three cents per mile per ton and the people find fault with it. By figures obtained by the Good Roads Association the cost per ton for hauling on the average good wagon road of Oregon is 25 cents per mile. Oregon roads are not good and the cost is from 50 cents to \$1 per ton a mile. On hard surface macadam road the cost is 8 cents per ton per mile.

Who is it that is now finding fault with a uniform system of building good roads? It is the man who most needs it—the farmer. The State Aid bill is the only one that demands the construction of good roads from business centers. The others allow the counties to build as they desire.

Is it not better to have a system of road building so that the state and county prisoners can be made to contribute to the common people their services in road building than for the people to pay for the maintenance of these prisoners and then hire their services out at a very small pay to manufacturing enterprises, thus giving low priced labor to manufacture their wares and then putting it in the open market to compete with the honest laboring man's wages, who is compelled to pay for his own living and compete in labor with those hired out prisoners? Is it just to the laborer? Is it just to the tax payer?

If the stove foundry people have the services of prisoners at 58 cents a day, what would an honorable moulder who does not have to go to jail to get a job, have to work for to compete with that kind of a price? The prisoners that are used in all other manufacturing enterprises, the same fault is to be overcome. We say let them build roads for the people who have to pay to have them taken care of.

Fruit growers of the Pacific Northwest met in Portland during the past week to attempt to form a central selling agency for the output of their orchards. This project was not entirely successful for the convention found itself without the necessary authority to represent the fruit growing associations of the Northwest, the growers coming as individuals rather than official representatives of these organizations. On this account, adjournment was taken until February 28, when a second meeting will be held at Walla Walla.

At that time each fruit growers' association is expected to send one authorized delegate and the convention, thus having power to act, may proceed with the organization. At the Portland meeting, which was called by President Atwell of the Oregon State Horticultural Society, considerable progress was made, for all agreed to the value of the proposed organization and a number of disputed points will be harmonized by the time the Walla Walla meeting is held.

A Lebanon woman is making chickens pay. During last year, her 36 hens laid 4804 eggs. One of her pullets laid 220 eggs and another 237. Her total net profit for the year from the flock of chickens was \$154.80 and she has 40 hens left.
