too good.

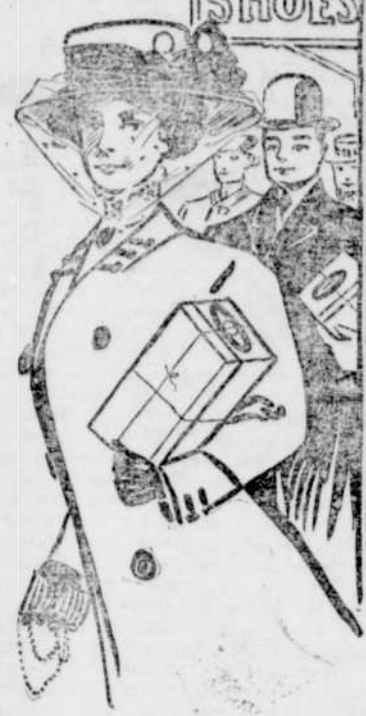

Another Teacher Is Asked

The assessed valuation of this
school district has just been received
by District Clerk Belfils. From
data received from him we are able
to give the following information of
the district.

The 1909 valuation was \$580,160.
There were eight mills levied last
year. This was found to be insuffi-
cient to meet the demands of the
growing district and was principal-
ly due to two causes. In 1908 no
levy was made and a deficiency ex-
isted. The building of the new
school house, and its equipment,
cost about \$1,250 more than the
bond issue. The building cost \$6,
300, furniture \$500, furnace \$450.
The new bonds were for \$6,000.

Principal James has asked for an
additional teacher, saying the
rooms are crowded and a new
teacher is necessary. The board of
directors at a meeting held on
Tuesday took the matter of employ-
ing an additional teacher as recom-
mended, under advisement.

The growth of the school dis-
trict in the last three years from
the school census has been, 1908,
142; 1909, 197; 1910, 248.

The monthly salary expense for
teachers and janitor is \$507.50. A
total of \$4,567.50 for the term. In-
terest on bonds is \$610. Incidentals,
including fuel, water, insurance
interest on warrants, etc., about
\$400 annually.

The board has this year levied
10 mills. One mill is for a sinking
fund to repay bonds. It would be
a wiser policy to have a
bank balance to commence a new
school term with so that teachers
could be paid promptly and not rely
on issuing warrants without the
money to meet them, thus requiring
the necessity of paying interest on

warrants and someone willing to
take the warrants. We find from
these calculations that the 9 mill
levy will not leave any balance this
year, but the sinking fund which
will be \$735 can be applied in that
manner temporarily and act as a
fund from which temporary loans
can be made to the regular school
fund. The liabilities of the district
for salary, interest, incidentals and
deficiency on building and furnish-
ing fund is, from these calculations,
\$6,827. The income from tax less
sinking fund is \$6,618. There al-
ways are some exonerations so that
the amount levied will be short of
the actual running expense of the
district.
