The demand reached the senate in a petition bearing 50 signatures. The document was addressed to "The President of the United States and to the Speaker of the House of Representatives," and read:

Starving Chinese Use Pets to Ward Off Death.

Shanghai.-A missionary who arrived here from the famine district, where he had been engaged in relief work, says that 3,000 persons are dy-ing daily and that 350,000 are wholly dependent on the foreign famine com mittee, which was organized here.

In many places dogs and cats are being killed for food and houses are pulled down by the occupants and the debris exchanged for anything that can be eaten.
