An unusual stir was made in army circles last week and came so suddenly upon the public that many thought we were on the verge of war with some nation and we were only waiting to find out with whom it was. The mobilizing of an army of almost 20,000 from all parts of the United States to the Mexican border in less than five days and keeping the intention of such an army movement from the big newspapers until it had actually occurred, ought to be a lesson to the nations of the world that, in the event of the necessity of war, our army facilities are not in such bad shape as some of our home alarmists would lead us to believe. The usual comment attending a matter of so grave movement as placing so much of an army on the border of a friendly nation. However Uncle Sam, as a guardian, is quite lenient towards those for whom the Monroe Doctrine makes him responsible, but like a wise father when he sees dissensions in his own household that can do no good and may do much harm, wisely asserts his authority to set matters right. We do not think any serious trouble will arise from these recent army movements. The smuggling of arms through this country to Mexico will be stopped and very probably the rebellion there will soon be restored to order. This of course is all guess work for not one of the important wars that have been fought by our country but what in their inception have been considered of small consequence.

A banquet in the Portland Commercial Club during the past week was attended by over 200 men and women more or less directly interested in the dairy interests of the state. Speeches were made by C. C. Chapman, representing the Commercial Club, T. S. Townsend, representing the creamery interests, Dr. Andrew C. Smith, of the State Board of Health, Prof. F. L. Kent, dean of the dairy department of the Oregon Agricultural College, W. W. Cotton, representing the Harrison system, and others, and the subject was discussed in all its bearings. At the close of the meeting a committee was appointed to formulate plans under which the various interests could be brought together for future practical and effective co-operation.

We unintentionally omitted to speak of the Currinsville band as being present at the Gresham and Estacada basketball games. The omission was not noticed until our attention was called to it this week. The music of the band added very much to the evenings entertainment and the community is to be congratulated that an organization such as it exists here. They are adding new members to the band, among whom are two ladies. The organization is appreciated in Estacada as much as it is in Currinsville and we are always glad to have them with us.

Governor West was just on the point of calling an extra session of the state legislature to correct certain data of the journal which seemed to be missing. The records had been checked and re-checked without finding the desired information, which affected the entire general appropriation bill. On Wednesday assistant clerk Hunt and his assistant Miss Irwin found the missing records, thus avoiding the necessity of calling an extra session. The missing information caused no small amount of talk as to incompetency and who was to blame for the trouble.
