The correct way to pronounce it is Es-ta-da, accent on the third syllable, a having the sound of 's' in ah in the two last syllables.

It will soon be time for the men who want to serve Estacada for the next two years to come forward and explain how they can do so to the best interest of the majority. At this election councilmen for wards 1, 2 and 3 will be elected to serve for four years and wards 4 and 5 for two years. At all elections thereafter the term of a councilman will be four years. The mayor, recorder and treasurer are elected for two years, the same as before.

Salem lays claim to a unique distinction among all the capital cities of the United States. It has made a greater net gain in population than any other state capital. Salem shows additions to her population amounting to 231.9 per cent during the ten-year period, as given in the figures of the census. No other state capital comes anywhere near this record.

St. Patrick's day in Estacada was remembered by a few of our citizens who wore the emerald green. In Portland where a rally was made by the patriotic Irish for a subscription fund in behalf of St. Mary's orphanage, the shamrock was sold so largely to the street pedestrian that all lovers of the "ould sod" felt all Portland was "Irish too."

Special fares have been made by the railroads for travel to the Portland Rose Festival, June 5-10, a rate of one and one-third the usual tariffs for the round trip having been agreed upon by the various lines. Oregon, Washington, Idaho and British Columbia will get the benefit of these reduced fares.

Estacada played River Mill a game of basketball on Wednesday night and a hard struggle ensued. The dam-builders showed their love for the game by holding the score practically even at all times. The pavilion held a very much interested, and very noisy, crowd. The final score was 10 to 8 in favor of Estacada.

**City Wins In Mandamus Suit**  
Last fall after the city council had refused to grant a liquor license to a Mr. Reed of Portland who had made application, mandamus proceedings were instituted to compel the council to grant the license. The attorney for the plaintiff claimed the city council had only the right to restrain and regulate the liquor traffic but not to prohibit. In an opinion just handed down by Judge Campbell he refused to sustain in the contention of the plaintiffs. It has been the opinion of the best informed who have expressed an opinion locally that the issuing of a license rests wholly with the council. In this opinion they have been sustained by the court.

Neighboring Districts Receive New Machines To Improve Public Highways

G. T. Hunt, road supervisor of district No. 49 and Mr. Thomas, supervisor Dist. No. 10, with a number of ranchers from these districts were at the freight depot on Tuesday rigging up two new road machines which had arrived. They were as much pleased as the little boy with his first pair of red topped boots, as they fitted the different parts together under the direction of H. W. Ireland, who had been sent here by the sales agents to superintend the work of placing the different parts in their respective places. The graders are the Austin Reversible road machine purchased from Seal & Co. of Portland who are the sales agents. District 49 is to have one of the machines and Districts 4 and 10 the other. 49 also received a number of scrapers and a Panama Junior two horse machine for easy handling on hill-side work. The Good Roads movement is bearing fruit of the right kind, for which every good citizen is justly proud. If we are to have good roads we must have the proper machines to construct them with if the most economical roads are built. We are to have an era of good road building in Eastern Clackamas that we predict will develop our resources as never before attempted. Let the good work go forward in our advice. 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**Few Attend Pruning Demonstration**  
Head Of Oregon Agriculture College Gives Lecture And Shows Best Way To Care For Trees

On Friday last, as previously mentioned in these columns, Professor C. I. Lewis, head of the Oregon Agricultural College, came to Estacada and gave a very interesting talk and demonstration at the experimental orchards in Garfield, on the subject of fruit pruning.

Possibly owing to its not having been properly advertised in advance, as such an event should have been, or possibly owing to the early hour of 11 a. m., the attendance at this demonstration was very poor and Prof. Lewis and others in his party felt hurt, at this slight.

It is certainly a poor reflection on Estacada and our far talked fruit raising interests and our local associations too. About twenty of the neighboring ranchers showed up and about half that number of people who had come out from Portland and other points, were present.

At least four times that number of Estacada fruit raisers and farmers should have been present; we who claim to be interested in fruit raising. Some felt they couldn't take off an hour or two, but kept on plowing or working and took no advantage of this chance to hear the best authority on the subject talk and demonstrate.

Those who missed the demonstration are of course the losers, but aside from their loss it casts discredit on us and our Estacada section and interest in same.

Prof. Lewis is probably as high, if not the highest, authority on the subject of fruit culture and kindred horticultural subjects as there is west of the Mississippi River. One whose daily mail comprises hundreds of letters inquiring about fruit and its raising. One who seldom is able to leave his regular work to give outside demonstrations. One who is called on to lecture all over the country on this subject and one who always draws a crowd. His writings are authorities on their subjects and his books cost money, but to the shame of the Estacada country we did not even show him the courtesy, not to mention care to obtain the knowledge of attending his talk and demonstration.

Those who did attend were well repaid, for he answered any and all questions as he demonstrated.

This is the kind of an incident that hurts Estacada and its hope to growth as a fruit section more than at first appears.—Contributed.
