Death Of One Of Estacada's Pioneers

Death Calls Mrs. Wm. E. Cary In Her Eighty-Fifth Year; Body Taken East For Interment

Mrs. Wm. E. Cary, who had been in ill health most of the winter, died at her home in Estacada at noon on Thursday. Mrs. Cary was among the first women in Estacada, as at the time she came here there were only three or four women of them. She has resided here since, except the winter of 1909-10 which she spent in California on account of her health.

She was born in Mercer, Mercer Co., Pa., January 26, 1836. At the age of nineteen she was married to Wm. E. Cary who died January 23rd, 1893 at Bolivar, Mo. Mrs. Cary continued to reside there until eight years ago when she came West. She spent one year in California, then came to Estacada, which was then just being platted, and was one of the pioneers of our city.

She was a member of the Baptist church but on account of being hard of hearing had not taken much part in church work since coming here.

On Friday morning R. W. Cary started from here for Bolivar with the remains. They will be interred by the side of her husband.

Mrs. Cary is survived by the following children: Harry L. Cary of Evansville, Ind.; Thos. O. Cary of Clinton, Mo.; Mrs. Luna Del Miller of Salt Lake City, Utah; W. F. and R. W. Cary of Estacada, Ore.; also by two sisters, Mrs. S. S. Johnson of St. Louis and Mrs. Minerva Nickum of New Castle, Pa., and two brothers, aged 81 and 88, who live in Oklahoma. As Mrs. Cary was the baby in her family it is readily discovered she belonged to a family with a record for longevity.

Death Of Young School Boy

Deane Townsend Succumbs To Infantile Paralysis And Spinal Meningitis After Weeks Illness

On Tuesday morning April 18th at 5:30 the angel of death again visited our little city and laid his icy hand on one of the children. Deane, as he was known to his playmates, was taken ill last Tuesday night, which increased in seriousness until the end came. Dr. Gilbert of Portland was called in consultation with Dr. Adix and their diagnosis was a complication of miletis (infantile paralysis) and spinal meningitis. He became totally paralyzed.

Deane Leverage was the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Townsend. He was born at Woodburn March 13th 1897 and came here with his parents about four years ago. He was a favorite among his playmates, who eagerly sought any news about his condition when it was learned that he was seriously ill. Services were held at the house on Wednesday at 2 p. m. Interment was made at Lone Oak Cemetery.

He is survived by his father and mother and the following brothers and sisters: Mrs. Eda Wood of Newberg, Lester Townsend of Newberg, Mrs. Ida Smith of Estacada, Ennis, George and Gladys at home.
