Parkplace Declared Champion

"Dishonorable" is Verdict in Case of Oregon City At-tending Debate

Howard James, president of the Clackamas School League has been sustained by the executive board who acted upon the protest of the Oregon City High School through its superintendent, Mr. Tooze. This board is composed of County Superintendent Gary and two Clackamas County teachers, who have signed this report, which in full is as follows:

To the Oregon City High School, Oregon City, Ore.

Regarding your protest against the treatment accorded your school by the authority in charge of the Debating Department of the Clack-amas School League, the Executive Committee finds as follows:

First—That the visit to Park-place by two members of your de-bating team on the evening of March 3rd, 1911, was, according to the rules of the State Debating League, "a dishonorable act."

Second—That such act, although dishonorable, was, according to eminent authority, not sufficient reason for countermarching the debate on March 10, between your school and the Estacada High School.

Therefore the debate of March 10 should be forfeited to the Oregon City High School, if there were no extenuating circumstances. Prof. James maintains that on March 5th, Prof. Tooze voluntarily relin-quished all rights to compete for championship honors, but Prof. Tooze claims that such rights were not relinquished. As these men are both of high repute, and its ap-pearing that there is a grave mis-understanding, we do not feel com-petent to render a decision on this point. This may not be law, but it seems to us to be justice.

Third—That the head of the de-bating department of the League had no right to render a final de-cision until your protest had been decided by the Executive Commit-tee.

In conclusion, as Parkplace has acted in good faith, we think, not-withstanding the various irregular-ities, that the championship should be awarded to that school.

Wood Working Plant Is Leased

Plan to Start Work Immedi-ately; Will Manufacture Wooden Articles

J. D. Hamlin of Marshfield and A. J. Darling have leased the wood working plant for three years with the privilege of buying it. Mr. Hamlin is a brother-in-law of Mr. Darling's. The two men have had business records and see in the future a manufacturing possibility, as outlined by the Progress. As yet conditions are not the best to accomplish what is desired but plans must be laid sometimes years ahead of their fulfillment. In many cases conditions have made it possible for a much earlier develop-ment than was anticipated, which we hope to be the case in Estacada.

Mr. Darling has had two years experience with the Oregon Chair Co. as foreman. They expect at present to manufacture lumber for building purposes and to handle sash and doors, later when the lumber suitable for the purpose can be secured here these will be by them manufactured. They will al-so establish a box factory at once
