Willamette Valley counties will combine to make splendid exhibits at the State Fair at Salem and later the fruits, vegetables, grains and grasses grown on Oregon soil will be sent East to be exhibited at five of the largest land shows in the country next fall. At a meeting at Albany during the past week, representatives from Linn, Benton, Marion, Polk and Lane counties agreed to the program and Yamhill county will join in the plan, also. The Willamette Valley exhibit will be shown at New York, Omaha, Chicago, Knoxville and St. Paul.

The Hill interests will spend \$25,000,000 in extensions and betterment to the properties in this state, according to advices received from the East. The sum will be made available for more mileage, aiding in the development of the whole state. The United Railways and The Oregon Electric will be extended and other feeder lines of the North Bank road, the backbone of the Hill system in the Northwest, will be pushed.

Colonist rates to Oregon will again be in effect this fall, from September 13 to October 15, on a basis of \$25 from St. Paul and the Missouri River to any point in this state, or \$33 from Chicago. Railroad traffic officials expect there will be a heavy movement to the Pacific Slope this fall, for there is a heavy inquiry already about the rates.

The State Land Board has finished a trip through the Lakeview region, inspecting land there under state control, and upon their return members of the Board expressed themselves as enthusiastic over the future prospects of that section of the state. In fact they were surprised that any public land remains in that part of Oregon.

Oregon Man Tries To Commit Suicide

William C. Morse tries to Cut Arteries in Arms and Legs While Enroute to Frisco, Utah

Salt Lake, July 17.—William C. Morse, aged 69 years, a passenger on the Idaho Express from Estacada, Or., to Frisco, Utah, tried to commit suicide this morning on the train near Ogden. He was discovered in the men's lavatory in a pool of blood, with a large pocket knife, endeavoring to sever the arteries of the right leg below the knee and in both forearms. The man is recovering and it is thought that he will be able to resume his journey in a few days.

Morse said that he and his wife had separated and that domestic troubles caused him to attempt his own life. He is a veteran of the Civil War and was imprisoned at Andersonville for 14 months.—Morning Oregonian, July 18.

The only Morse that we have knowledge of in this vicinity is G. R. Morse who for about a year had a store at Eagle Creek, which he closed out about the first of July. He then went to the Coast for a few days visit and then expected to return back East. Mr. Morse, when arranging to sell out his store said he had come West for the benefit of his health, that he had been much benefited, but that his folks desired to return East and he had made up his mind to return. We do not know that the Wm. C. Morse spoken of is the same man as our G. R. Morse. It was not known here that G. R. Morse had any domestic trouble.
