FRED JORG

Farmers and stockraisers of the Pacific Northwest have an opportunity to win a number of valuable prizes at the big land shows to be held in the East and Middle West next winter. At New York City's first land show, to be held in Madison Square Garden November 3 to 12, cups valued at \$1000 each will be offered for the best exhibits of single products. These include wheat, oats, potatoes, corn, barley, apples, sugar beets, hops, alfalfa, etc.

The New York exposition will be the biggest land show ever held in America and the most valuable prizes ever offered for agricultural products will be awarded. Agriculture as it is generally practiced, dry farming and irrigation method will be demonstrated. Moving pictures, lectures, literature and actual farmers will demonstrate the advantages of owning and developing land.

The show will voice the cry of "back to the soil". It will show tilers of worn-out land how to rejuvenate their soils or where to seek richer farms; it will point the city man to green fields and direct the immigrant. It is of special advantage for Oregon and Washington to be well represented at this big show and commercial bodies and the railroads are urging the fullest co-operation by Northwest producers. F. W. Graham, Western Immigration Agent for the Great Northern Railway, Portland, will supply entry blanks to all who will exhibit and will give full information as to preparations for shipping. There is no entry fee required.

Urging the governors of all the states to help along the "See America First" movement, Governor West has addressed a letter to them, calling their attention to the beauties of the Pacific Northwest and making an urgent appeal to do everything possible to stay the tide of foreign travel and turn it to the Pacific Coast. Governor West calls attention to the fact that this tendency on the part of Americans is a great economic loss to the country and should be combated on every possible occasion. He estimates that \$3,000,000 is spent abroad every season by Americans that should be used in seeing their own country instead. The Governor calls attention to the big convention called for Baltimore January 22-27, 1912, when the "See-America-First" movement will be discussed and asks that each state send a big delegation.

Crook County will have a big fair and livestock show lasting from October 11 to 14. Preparations to gather a comprehensive exhibit of the products of Central Oregon for the show have all ready started and each of the four largest cities of the county, Prineville, Bend, Redmond and Madras, will have one day at the fair. The exhibits to be shown will be sent to Chicago and New York after the fair closes for exhibition at the big land shows next winter.

Sumpter will have the biggest celebration of the year on Labor Day, September 4, which is a bigger holiday among the miners than even the Fourth of July. Rock-drilling contests and other sports characteristic of a mining region will be held.

Lane County expects to have the biggest showing of registered stock it has ever assembled for its annual county fair, opening September 20 and lasting four days. The exhibit pavilion will be much enlarged and a great showing of farm products will be made.

## Had A Very Enjoyable Time

For the information of those who have never visited the sea coast to enjoy its invigorating and pleasant outing trips and not for the purpose of boring our readers with fish stories, we desire to speak of Newport as we saw it on our recent outing to the coast. It was not the trip we had first planned to make, but circumstances were against us in our plans so Newport was our second choice. Like all second choices it was with some misgivings as to our pleasure at Newport that we left home. We had endeavored to get as much information about how to get the most pleasure and benefit from the trip before leaving, but opinions varied greatly and we started out with the idea that it was not what we wanted to do but were compelled to owing to circumstances.

We left Portland at an early hour on a Monday morning and went by way of Albany and Corvallis, giving us our first view of the famed and fertile Willamette Valley on its eastern border. It was harvest time, the shocked grain, wheat and oats, and the threshed stacks of straw, together with its orchards and hop yards, were evidence sufficient to maintain this reputation. Going through the mountains from a short distance from Corvallis to the Coast is but the ordinary mountain scenery encountered anywhere here.

We arrived at Newport at 7 p. m., over an hour late, and by 9:30 had our tent up, supper over, and tucked away in our camp bunks for the night's rest. Four o'clock next morning found the younger members of our party ready for sight-seeing on the beach. From that time until our time came to break camp and return home, every hour spent at Newport and on Nye Beach was a pleasant one. There were sea curios to hunt, consisting of starfish, agates, sea moss, seaweed and a few shells. There were rock oysters, clams, and mussels of dig. The rock oyster is imbedded in solid rock and it requires a drill and a sledge hammer to break open these reef rocks, that are exposed at low tide, in order to get them. There are also beds of eastern-planted and the native Yaquina bay oysters. These are private grounds, but can be visited and the oysters bought cheap.

There is fishing in the bay and ocean, both from boats and on shore. Beaver Creek, about six miles south, affords good trout fishing. While we were there the run of fish consisted of tom cod, rock cod, sea bass, flounder, sole, perch, kelp and the every-ready-to-bite mud cat. An unusual thing on this beach was the appearance of many whales to be seen, spouting and floundering about close enough to shore to be seen without the aid of a glass. The sea-going boats advertised whale hunting excursions and were well patronized. It was considered great sport to shoot them and many were hit, but these monsters only flapped their tails in a manner to indicate that something unusual was doing and would disappear for a short time. We did not hear of any being killed.

Many places of interest can be visited, chief of which are the Light House, noted as being the extreme western point of the United States, the Devil's Punch Bowl, the Agate Beach and the life saving station.

Our return trip was made by way of Corvallis and the west side of the Willamette, giving a splendid view through one of the best agricultural districts of Oregon.
