#### To Raise Raspberries

At a meeting of the Estacada Fruit Growers association on Tuesday in the City Hall, L. R. Macintosh, of Prosser, Wash., talked to the members about the growing of the Cuthbert berry. H. E. Chick of Cal., who has been trying to induce our people here to go into the growing of this particular berry, was also present and made some preliminary remarks. He said he wanted our people to learn from one who has been extensively in the business as a grower to tell about it and had made arrangements for him to come here.

As has previously been said Mr. Chick is a California man and was here in the interest of the California Packing Co., said to be the largest packing company in the world. His company has absorbed the Oregon Packing Co. and they are endeavoring to introduce the growing of the Cuthbert berry here to keep their Portland packing plant working. Mr. Macintosh's talk was not of the best order. He simply sat among the members talking of his experience of seven

years in raising berries as we would with one another. As space does not permit this issue to give any lengthy article we will give as briefly as we can some of the statements made as to his experience.

The rows should be seven feet apart and the plants set 22 to 24 inches apart in the row. It will require 3,000 to 3,200 plants per acre. The rows should run East and West. The trench to plant in can be made with a plow with moldboard on both sides. The plants dropped by hand and then the soil thrown back by a plow. January to March is the best time to set plants. The plants can be secured at \$5.50 per thousand. By addressing the secretary of the Estacada Fruit Growers association you can find where. About half a crop is realized the second year under favorable conditions. The third year a full crop. They are not short lived and Mr. Macintosh said he knows of full crops being grown on an acreage set twenty-two years ago. The cutting or trimming out of old growth should not be done until January and it is better to break them off than to cut. Do not cut the ends off unless they are weak and frozen. They grow even to the height of 14 feet. When the young growth is 2 feet high in the spring is the time to break them off so that from 3 to 4 stalks are left to the hill.
