GOVERNOR WEST TO VISIT ESTACADA SATURDAY, OCTOBER 21

Commercial Club has Planned Dinner at Which Governor West will Speak; Other Popular Speakers to be Present; Plates for 100 People

Governor West sent word on Tuesday to the committee in charge of the arrangements for the Commercial Club dinner, that he would be glad to be present at this social function, and to meet our citizens. This will be the first time in the history of Estacada when our beautiful little city will be host to Oregon's governor. Governor West has particularly asked that he be given a chance to meet and shake hands with the citizens of this community.

For some time past the Commercial Club has intended to give a dinner, and with that end in view have worked hard to make the affair one worthy of the name. They have made arrangements with the Hotel Estacada for 100 plates for Saturday night October 21st. The fact that the dinner will be given at the Hotel Estacada and will be under the direction of Mr. Laury spells success for the Club in that direction, as these two have made names for themselves throughout this entire country.

Soon after the idea was conceived to hold a dinner, the committee got in touch with the Governor, relative to having him present at this event as one of the speakers. As the Governor's presence is very much desired throughout the state, his time is necessarily very limited.

The fact that he has agreed to be present on this evening means much to our growing city.

Mr. Laury will provide for one hundred plates. Tickets have been printed and the committee is disposing of the same. As soon as the one hundred tickets have been sold, no more can be accommodated, as the hotel provides for only one hundred and will not allow over that number to attend. The dinner costs \$1 per plate. Already the tickets are in great demand and the committee is jubilant over the outcome.

The out of town speakers who will be present will be Governor

West; T. B. Wilcox, president of the Oregon Development League and Frank Riley, who will talk on "Good Roads." Others who have reserved tickets from out of town are, B. S. Josselyn, F. D. Hunt and W. F. Buchanan of the Portland Railway Light & Power Company and W. H. Chapin of the Realty Board of Portland. The speakers of the evening are all well known men and their presence can mean but one thing, and that one thing must be what everyone wishes to see—success.

Previous to the dinner the Governor will hold a reception for one hour in which time he hopes to meet the people of this locality. The time, as set for the dinner, is 8 o'clock sharp.

The Estacada Commercial Club has been in existence only a few months, and in that short space of time has made its self felt in matters of interest to this section. Enthusiasm in the work on hand is to be seen in the faces of the members and the interest in the work is greater now than at any time in the history of the city. The Commercial Club is filling the place that has been created for it and is doing the work in a very creditable manner. Here's to the success of the Club. Let us put our shoulders to the wheel and keep things moving along in the future better than they are at present. It is but our duty to our community and our neighbors.

To Get Better Road To Estacada

Commercial Club Road Men Find Much Interest in the Proposed New Road

The Commercial Club's delegation of business men, who were to go through the Logan and Viola country to become better acquainted with that section and to co-operate with them in securing a better and shorter road into Estacada, started about seven o'clock Tuesday morning on their errand.

They met and talked with most of the people living in these neighborhoods and found them very anxious to secure better trade facilities with this city. The committee was very much encouraged by the spirit shown by the residents of those communities and will immediately take the matter up with the railroad company, as they desire to cross some of the company's ground.

The idea, as explained by a member of the committee, is to shorten the road and get a better grade to this locality, by leaving the present road at John Eicken's place and come around by way of River Mill. This, it is estimated, will shorten the distance to Logan by several miles and will make a much better grade into our city.

The committee returned about 6 o'clock, having spent the entire day in looking over these two sections and meeting their citizens. The men who made this trip were, Roger Cary, E. F. Cruise, Al Lindsey, J. W. Reed and J. R. Mc-

Curdy. The next trip which will be taken by this committee will be to George, where they hope to be able to go before very many more days roll around.
