**Steel Towers All Erected**

Oregon's first great steel tower electric power line, connecting the River Mill power station on Clackamas River with Portland, has just been finished, and so far as the transmission problem is concerned, about the first of the month Portland will be able to get energy from the latest installation of the street-car company. Work at the dam is not far advanced, the energy from the first unit set at River Mill is not likely to become a regular supply to Portland earlier than the first of December.

In the great transmission line there are 224 steel towers and 11 poles, each tower weighing 3938 pounds, and each pole 3280 pounds. The minimum distance apart for towers or steel poles is 460 feet, and the maximum 530 feet, making great spans for an Oregon transmission line. Towers are bolted to shoes set seven feet in the ground, and the steel poles have a bed of eight feet of concrete. The cost of the entire line, consisting of towers and poles and one transmission set of three cables, a ground wire and telephone line, for the entire length of 28 miles between River Mill and Station L, at foot of East Lincoln Street, is \$175,000. The towers are for a double line, and at a later date, when another installation is made on the Clackamas by the company, a second set of three cables may be hung on the other side opposite the set now in place. With one set of cables, the line will handle 20,000 kilowatts of current, at 60,000 volts. This is equivalent to about 27,000 horsepower of energy. When the second transmission set of cables is put on, the capacity of the tower line will be increased to about 54,000 horsepower of energy.

The height of the towers varies from 71 feet to 91 feet, the greater elevation being necessitated by uneven ground, so that the power cable may be kept a uniform height above the surface. The cable used

for power transmission is 250,000 circular mill flexible copper, of 19 strands. This cable represents the latest in electric transmission at high voltage and is expected to deliver the energy generated at the River Mill plant here with the very minimum of loss. Three cables are used in the circuit, which is of the polyphase type.

The new line follows the old power line right of way of the company connecting Estacada with Portland for practically all the way of 28 miles.

Forman G. I. Ibbotson had charge of the tower erection work for the company, and required but four months in which to complete it. F. F. Sullivan was the engineer in charge, and Engineer Osborne was the general superintendent directing the work.—Telegram.

**GREAT NATURAL BRIDGE.**

Justice Marshall Called it "God's Greatest Miracle in Stone." The great Natural Bridge, which is one of the natural wonders of the United States, overlooks the Juana river valley, being on the western slopes of the Blue mountains. It is just about the center of the state. It approaches Niagara in grandeur and exceeds it in height, and awful majesty. It is a single block of limestone, with many shades of color. The walls are smooth, as if cut with chisels, and there is no sign of displacement.

The visitor follows a tumbling cascade down a deep fissure in the mountain under some of the largest arborescent trees in the world and, turning down a line of steps cut into the precipice, suddenly finds himself by a swift stream in a dark canyon and the great bridge far above him.

Washington when a surveyor for Lord Fairfax visited the Natural bridge and carved his name, where it may still be seen. The original bridge tract was granted by King George III, to Thomas Jefferson in 1774. After he was president Jefferson visited the place, surveyed it and made the map with his own hands. Jefferson spoke of the place as "a famous place that will draw the attention of the world." Chief Justice Marshall wrote of the bridge as "God's greatest miracle in stone." Henry Clay wrote of "the bridge not made with hands that spans a river, carries a highway and makes two mountains one."

**FOOT OF THE BEE.**

Strong Claws and Flexible Pads For Rough and Smooth Surfaces.

The astounding miracle of insects walking nonchalantly on a ceiling is explained by Tiekner Edwards, chairman of the British Beekeepers' association, in his book on "The Lore of the Honeybee." Insects owe such power, it appears, to an ingenious device which is well illustrated in the foot of the bee.

She has a pair of short, strong double claws, which will take her securely over all but the smoothest and shiniest surfaces, and it is with these claws that bees form themselves into dense clusters and knots and cables within the hive, holding hand to hand, as it were, in all directions. But when there is nothing for the claw to hold by another part of the foot comes into play. This is a soft, flexible pad, which is always covered by a thick, oily exudation. In walking the bee puts her feet down three at a time, the pads adhering instantly they come into contact with the smooth surface. At the next step the other three pads come into play, while the first three are stripped off. But each foot is capable of attaching and detaching itself independently of its fellows.

In this case, we learn, "the stripping is accomplished by downward pressure of the claws of the same foot."

Saxons. Saxon is from "sax," a sword, and so the "Men of the Sword." In the early days the Saxons took for themselves such names as "Bloody Ax," "Skull Cleaver," "Death's Head," names which in no way belied their original character. The "berserker rage" of the old Vikings spread death and destruction all around the coasts which they haunted, and by the terror of their name they led the Christians to put into their litany the prayer: "Deliver us, O Lord, from the fury of the Northmen." Very terrible were these old Saxons, and to this day the most dreadful of all the people on the face of the earth, when they are thoroughly roused, are the descendants of the same Men of the Sword.—New York American.
