Sterilizing Liquids.

Perfect sterilization of liquids by means of filtration only seems to be made possible on a large scale through a process originated by two French scientists and reported to the Academy of Scientists at a recent meeting. It is known that membranes of collodion have the property of re-taining all the microbes in a liquid filtered through them. But they are very fragile and therefore impractical outside of the laboratory. By re-enforcing the collodion membrane with a fine wire screen imbedded in it, just as a pane of glass is thus re-enforced. the two scientists constructed a filter not only strong enough for practical purposes but so effective as to exclude even molecules of salts dissolved in the liquid.


