Single Tax By Counties

Oregon will vote on the single tax amendment by counties this fall, according to the state supreme court, which has ordered Secretary of the State Olcott to place the single tax issue on the ballots. The contention was whether the matter should be voted on by counties separately, or the state as a whole. Single tax advocates are pleased over the decision, for while it might be very doubtful of the state voting the amendment, it is claimed some of the counties are sure to carry.—Oregon City Courier.

Poultry Association To Open Office

Girl Accidentally Shoots Self With .22

Elvada Schmidt was accidentally shot and seriously wounded last Friday morning at 9 o'clock near her home in Springwater, when a cartridge which had refused to discharge, suddenly went off.

Miss Schmidt had been shooting squirrels and was near the granary when one of the cartridges in a .22 refused to fire. She took the gun from her shoulder and turned the barrel toward her body, evidently with the intention of looking down the barrel or taking out the cartridge. In some way the gun was jarred and the shell discharged, the bullet entering just below the left shoulder and piercing the lungs. Dr. Adix was hurriedly called and attended to the wound. At present she is reported to be getting along very nicely.
