**Council Grants Water
To Terrace Addition**
At a special meeting of the council, Monday evening, it was decided on report of a committee composed of Lindsey, Hawkins and Underwood and City Recorder Devore to extend the present water mains through Terrace addition, work to begin as soon as arrangements can be made.
The estimate of cost by the committee is 1,000 feet of 6 and 4 inch pipe with fire plugs and other fixtures, labor, etc., \$614.50.
A provision is made that the owners of the addition assume responsibility for the work if there should be legal objection to the extension. A provision is also made that the water may be shut off if the addition refuses to come within the corporate limits.
A committee was chosen, composed of Mayor Reed, Aldermen Lindsey and Underwood to confer with the P. R. L. & P. Co. relative to securing right of way across the company's property for a road to the bridge and also right of way for the city sewer.
