Division of County
If the people of Clackamas county are to vote at the coming election on the question of a division of the county, it is time that action preliminary to a decision, should be under way. Petitions for division must be filed at Salem four months before election, which would bring the date about July 1.
It has been evident to the residents of East Clackamas for years that the present county seat is badly located for the transaction of their business as it is necessary to pass through another county in a roundabout way to reach it. The expense of travel and the inconvenience has been evident and in addition, this part of the county is entitled to more consideration than it receives, taking into account the territory and the taxation.
The eastern part of the county is naturally separated by a range of hills from the western and it is doubtful whether the ridge will be crossed by more direct means of transportation.
The Progress suggests that the ball be started rolling by meetings called in the various precincts. At any rate let the sentiment of the voters of East Clackamas be ascertained as soon as possible and a start made for division if the majority favors it.

It's coming along toward spring now and Estacada will do well to arrange for a good cleanup of its streets and alleys. Economy of the city finances will be necessary this year, with the amount of public improvement now in sight and the citizens might, with profit, arrange a "cleanup day" where everybody may get out and help make the city tidy.
With the prospects of a big immigration to Oregon this year, the meeting of the first irrigation congress which adjourned last week will prove beneficial in that the many interests which have been working at cross purposes were brought together and a plan for intelligent team work developed. It will mean less bickering and expense and consequently a lower price for irrigated land and that will mean more settlers.
