Estacadans are Ready

BUSINESS HOUSES TO CLOSE

Street Cleaning Brigade Will Hustle 8 Hours if Necessary - Prepare Your Rubbish for Hauling.

Bright and early tomorrow morning probably more than 100 men from every walk of life will turn out and give Estacada a cleanup that it has sorely needed for some time. The streets and alleys downtown will have first attention and after that the residence sections.

Everybody has taken enthusiastically to the proposed cleanup. Mayor Reed and R. M. Standish who circulated written agreements to work tomorrow, found every person signing willingly. And in addition, the business houses agreed to close most of the day. Employers and employes will work side by side picking up and carting away the debris. In this connection, all lot owners are urged to pile the rubbish in two piles—one of burnable debris; the other unburnable. This will be hauled away. It will expedite work.

Terrace Addition Water Main Costs Only \$440

At a special meeting of the city council Friday evening, the contract for the 1,900 feet of pipe for the Terrace addition water main was awarded for \$310, which price includes the fixtures. There were present Mayor Reed and Aldermen Lindsey, Hawkins and Underwood.

The change from the 6 inch pipe to 4 inch worked a still larger reduction in the cost which was originally \$382. And the city bought 200 feet more of pipe. The pipe, fixtures, digging and laying of the main will total \$440, which is \$200 less than originally estimated. The ditch is practically completed and laying of the mains will begin immediately.

Bids are now being received for digging the ditch and laying the tiling in Wade street between Fourth and Eighth streets. This is the ditch which was dug by volunteers and later caved in causing a damming of the water.

PREPARING FOR PREACHERS

First Day of Session April 16-17 Will be Given Over to Reception and Speechmaking at Church.

Preparations are going forward for the meeting of the Salem district of Methodist ministers to take place in Estacada April 16-17. Rev. W. R. F. Browne, pastor of the Methodist church, has received some correspondence but the program has not yet been announced.

The first evening there will be a reception at which three addresses of welcome will be made. Mayor J. W. Reed for the city; Professor James for the Methodist church and Rev. W. Givens for the Christian church. The response will be by Rev. James Morrow of Salem, district superintendent. The musical program is in charge of Mrs. A. K. Morton.

Prizes Offered Pupils at Estacada Juvenile Fair

As an incentive to school pupils to engage in agriculture and manual training a juvenile fair in charge of Professor James of Estacada will be held in Estacada district the latter part of August. Clackamas county is divided into ten districts. Estacada is one and the contestants who are divided into two classes, A and B, the former including those between 12 and 20 and the latter between 5 to 12 years old, will contest locally and at the state fair from this county.

All children of Estacada and vicinity are eligible. The county committee will visit all ten fairs and award prizes. It is an important movement and the winners' exhibit will be sent to the state fair where prizes of about \$500 will be awarded. A committee will shortly solicit for prizes for this district. The following prizes will be awarded by

the county committee: \$25 for the best general exhibit; \$25 for best exhibit of vegetables; \$18 suit for best practical piece of furniture; \$20 suit for best mechanical toy; \$5 for best muskmelon and a years subscription to the Pacific Northwest to every winner of a prize; \$5 for field corn in class A.

Prizes will also be awarded in both classes for specimens of field corn, sweet corn, pop corn, muskmelons, watermelons, squashes, potatoes, cabbage, celery, grain selection, bird houses, piece of furniture, vegetable collection of onions, turnips, beets, carrots, cauliflower, tomato, parsnip and cucumber, pair Barred Rocks, pair White Rocks, pair Buff Orpingtons, Black Minorca, vegetable collection No. 2 of peas, string beans and lettuce, pumpkin, labor saving device, mechanical toy, canned fruit, bread, jelly, mending, darning, aprons, print or calico dresses, asters, sweet peas, chickens, ducks, pigs.

Charter Member of First Oregon Grange is Dead

Mrs. Sara Green Davis, a charter member of the first Oregon grange died at her home in Garfield, last Friday after a lingering illness. Services for the immediate family were conducted at the home, Sunday at 1 o'clock and at 2 o'clock public services took place at Mt. Zion church where a large crowd was in attendance. Deceased was a member of the Christian church of Estacada and the services were conducted by Rev. W. Givens, assisted by Rev. Mr. Browne and C. F. Swander. P. F. Standish and the Memorial church quartet had charge of the music. The burial was at Zion cemetery in charge of the Garfield grange, of which deceased was a charter member.

Mrs. Davis was born at Albany, N. Y., Jan. 25, 1851. She was married May 24, 1867 to William Davis who survives her. Of the union seven sons and three daughters were born, all living. She crossed the plains with her husband settling in Clackamas county in 1868. She was a charter member of Marshfield grange No. 1 and also of Garfield grange.

PLANS NEW ESTACADA THEATRE

W. A. Heylman May Put up Structure to Seat 450 People To Have a Parquet and Two Balconies.

If the plans of W. A. Heylman are realized, work will begin shortly on a modern little theatre on Main street, negotiations for the lot being about completed.

The structure, if built, will be 25 by 80 feet, two stories and a half high of frame. Modern lighting and exits are to be furnished. The lobby is to be 10 feet extending the entire front of the building and the stage 20 feet deep with a height of two stories and a half.

The parquet occupies the remaining fifty feet. The first balcony and the gallery are to be in the second story. In front of the balcony and facing Main street, it is planned to put in offices.

Drama may be presented on the stage as well as moving pictures. Mr. Heylman has been planning the building for some time and has about decided to construct it.

Hatching 12,000 Chicks A Month Near Estacada

That the poultry industry in this region is rapidly increasing is vouched for by Justice Givens who is something of a chicken raiser himself. He says he has kept pretty close count and within a radius of five miles of Estacada there are 98 incubators in operation.

"That means a capacity of 16,000 eggs," he said. "If 75 per cent hatches, there are 12,000 green chickens turned loose in the world every 21 days, providing, said incubators and the owners thereof keep busy."
